## Septuagesima Sunday

**GOSPEL Matt 20:1-16** At that time, Jesus spoke to His disciples this parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like to a householder, who went out early in the morning to hire laborers into his vineyard. And having agreed with the laborers for a penny a day, he sent them into his vineyard. And going out about the third hour, he saw others standing in the marketplace idle. And he said to them: 'Go you also into my vineyard, and I will give you what shall be just.' And they went their way. Again, he went out about the sixth and the ninth hour and did in like manner. But about the eleventh hour he went out and found others standing, and he saith to them: 'Why stand you here, all the day idle?' They said to him: 'Because no man hath hired us.' He saith to them: 'Go ye also into my vineyard.' And when evening was come, the lord of the vineyard said to his steward: 'Call the laborers and pay them their hire, beginning from the last even to the first.' When therefore they were come that came about the eleventh hour, they received every man a penny. But when the first also came, they thought that they should receive more: And they also received every man a penny. And receiving it they murmured against the master of the house, saying: 'These last have worked but one hour, and thou hast made them equal to us, that have borne the burden of the day and the heat.' But he answering said to one of them: 'friend, I do thee no wrong: didst thou not agree with me for a penny? Take what is thine and go thy way: I will also give to this last even as to thee. Or is it not lawful for me to do what I will? Is thy eye evil, because I am good?' So, shall the last be first and the first last. For many are called but few chosen."



**Valentine of Terni, officially Saint Valentine of Rome,** born 226 AD was a widely recognized 3rd-century Roman saint and since the High Middle Ages is associated with a tradition of courtly love.

He was a Roman Priest at a time when emperor Claudias was persecuting the church. Claudias issued an edict that prohibited the marriage of young people. This was based on the hypothesis that unmarried soldiers fought better than married soldiers because married soldiers might be afraid of what might happen to them or their wives or families if they died.

This edict immediately presented a problem to the Christian church. The idea of encouraging young people to marry within the Christian church was what Saint Valentine was about. And he secretly married them because of the edict.

Saint Valentine was eventually caught, imprisoned and tortured for performing marriage ceremonies against the command of Emperor Claudius. There are legends surrounding Saint Valentine's actions while in prison.

One of the men who was to judge him in line with the Roman law at the time was called Asterius, whose daughter was blind. Saint Valentine was supposed to have prayed with and healed the young girl with such astonishing effect that Asterius himself became Christian as a result.

In the year 269 AD, on February 14th, Saint Valentine was sentenced to a three-part execution of a beating, stoning, and finally decapitation all because of his stand for Christian marriage. The story goes that the last words he wrote were in a note to Asterius' daughter. He inspired today's romantic missives by signing it, "from your Valentine."

The relics of Saint Valentine were kept in the Church and Catacombs of San Valentino in Rome, which remained an important pilgrim site throughout the Middle Ages until the relics were transferred to the church of Santa Prassede. The flower-crowned skull of Saint Valentine is exhibited in the Basilica of Santa Maria in Cosmedin, Rome; other relics were brought to Whitefriar Street Carmelite Church in Dublin, Ireland where they remain to this day.

Saint Valentine has come to be known as the patron saint of lovers. If he were here today, he would say to married couples – "there comes a time where you're going to have to suffer. It's not going to be easy to maintain your commitment and your vows in marriage. Don't be surprised if the 'gushing' love that you have for someone changes to something less "gushing" but maybe much more mature."

## FATHER SAFREED'S REFLECTIONS

## BAPTISM OF BLOOD (BOB) AND BAPTISM OF DESIRE (BOD) V

The following is a list of [top shelf] pre-Vatican II theologians who teach baptism of desire and baptism of blood. This includes St. Alphonsus Ligouri, St. Robert Bellarmine, St. Thomas Aquinas, St. Ambrose and St. Augustine all Doctors of the Church.

[1] Abarzuza; [2] Aertnys; [3] Billot; [4] Cappello; [5] Coronata; [6] Davis; [7] Herrmann; [8] Herve; [9] Hurter; [10] Iorio; [11] Lennerz; [12] Ligouri; [13] McAuliffe; [14] Merkelbach; [15] Noldin; [16] Ott; [17] Pohle [18] Prummer; [19] Regatillo; [20] Sabetti; [21] Sola; [22] Tanquerey; [23] Zalba; [24] Zubizarreta; [25] Bellarmine—and of course— Aquinas; Ambrose; Augustine

There are others, perhaps many others. I have just listed these theologians based on a text of theology I have. Theologians speak of "theological categories," but these categories all pertain to the faith, and practically speaking there is no significant difference. There is:

- [1] Common teaching of the doctrines
- [2] Theologically certain
- [3] Catholic doctrine, constant
- [4] Fidei Proxima, pertains to faith
- [5] De Fide, of the faith

All the above theologians place BOD in category [1], common teaching of the doctrines, and at least 7 or 8 of them place it in the category of "de fide." BOB is also placed in the common teaching of the doctrines. None of them reject the teaching — as both BOB and BOD are held by common consent.

Pope Pius IX's principle of the teaching of theologians:

"All Catholics are obliged to adhere to a teaching if Catholic theologians hold it by common consent, or hold it as de fide, or Catholic doctrine or as theologically certain."

All Catholics are bound to abide by the teaching of theologians and the Church regarding baptism of desire and baptism of blood. Therefore, the Feeneyite position represents some degree of theological error, perhaps even heresy, and those who are obstinate in this error commit a mortal sin against the Faith.

It has been my experience, and the experience of others, that all of these considerations make no impression on those who adhere to the Feeneyite rejection of BOD and BOB, and they simply continue on their erroneous path.
