Twenty First Sunday After Pentecost

GOSPEL Matt. 18:23-35 At that time, Jesus spoke to His disciples this parable: "The kingdom of heaven is likened to a king, who would take an account of his servants. And when he had begun to take the account, one was brought to him, that owed him ten thousand talents. And as he had no means of paying, his lord commanded that he should be sold, with his wife and children, and all that he had, and payment to be made. But that servant falling down, besought him, saying: 'Have patience with me, and I will pay thee all.' And the lord of that servant being moved with pity, let him go and forgave him the debt.

"But when that servant was gone out, he found one of his fellow-servants that owed him a hundred pence: and laying hold of him, he throttled him, saying: 'Pay what thou owe.' And his fellow-servant falling down, besought him, saying: 'Have patience with me, and I will pay thee all.' And he would not: but went and cast him into prison, till he paid the debt. "Now his fellow servants seeing what was done, were very much grieved, and they came, and told their lord all that was done. Then his lord called him: and said to him: 'Thou wicked servant, I forgave thee all the debt, because you entreated me: Should not you also have had compassion on thy fellow servant, even as I had compassion on thee?' And his lord being angry, delivered him to the torturers until he paid all the debt. So also My heavenly Father will do to you, if you do not each forgive your brothers from your hearts."



Saint John Cantius, Confessor (23 June 1390 – 24 December 1473) was a Polish priest, scholastic philosopher, physicist and theologian. He was born in Kęty, a small town in Poland. He attended the Kraków Academy at which he attained a bachelor degree. In 1418 he became a Doctor of Philosophy. Upon graduation he spent the next three years conducting philosophy classes at the university, while preparing for the priesthood.

Upon his ordination, he became rector at the school of the Canons Regular of the Most Holy Sepulcher in Miechow. While there, he was offered a professorship of Sacrae Scripturae (Sacred Scripture) back at his alma mater. He attained a doctorate in theology and eventually became director of the theology department. St. John held the professorship until his death in 1473.

He spent many hours copying manuscripts of the Holy Scriptures, theological tracts, and other scholarly works. He became well known in the city for his generosity and compassion toward the poor, especially needy students at the university. St. John subsisted on what was strictly necessary to sustain his life, giving alms regularly to the poor. He made one pilgrimage to Jerusalem and four pilgrimages on foot to Rome.

John Cantius was beatified in Rome by Pope Clement X on 28 March 1676. He was named patron of Poland and Lithuania by Pope Clement XII in the year 1737. Ninety-one years after his beatification, Blessed John Cantius was canonized on 16 July 1767, by Pope Clement XIII.

The Roman Breviary distinguishes him with three hymns; he is the only confessor not a bishop who has been given this honor in the Roman Catholic liturgy.

St. John Cantius is a popular saint in Poland. A number of churches and schools founded by Polish communities throughout North America are named in his honor. St. John Cantius's feast day was inserted into the General Roman Calendar in 1770, it is assigned to October 20th.

Gospel Commentary. The king is God; the servant is mankind; the ten thousand talents, equal to tens of millions of dollars, signify the enormous and excessive debts which men contract by their sins against God: a sum so exceedingly great as to show clearly that the debt of man to God is without limit, and truly overwhelming.

The hundred pence, a small sum, equal to perhaps six or seven dollars, denotes the offences which others have given to us, and which, in comparison with our offences against God, are insignificant. By this parable, therefore, Jesus intended to say: As God forgives your immense debts if you sorrowfully pray for forgiveness, so ought you to forgive your fellow men their comparatively light debts when they ask forgiveness of you. Unless you grant it, you shall receive no pardon from My Father.

The unmerciful servant is like all hard-hearted persons; particularly, 1, rulers who oppress the people by excessive taxes; 2, those who oppress widows and orphans, and keep from servants the wages due them; 3, those who have no patience with their debtors, but deprive them of house and goods rather than be indulgent to them. God will deal with such men in the other world as they have dealt with their neighbors in this. 4. Finally, all persons who will not forgive injuries done them, but preserve hatred in their hearts; who bring such as have injured them before the courts, and even seek to injure them out of revenge. How can they hope to obtain mercy?

To forgive from the heart is meant to banish all hatred and desire of revenge, to bear in our hearts a sincere love towards our enemy, and to manifest it by works of charity. If we think of the multitude of sins, which God has forgiven us, how can we refuse to forgive trifling wrongs against ourselves? At any rate, let us not forget that God forgives us only when we also forgive from the heart.



Saint Raphael the Archangel The name of the angel, Raphael, "God Heals" appears only in the Biblical Book of Tobit. The Book of Tobit is considered deuterocanonical by Catholics, Orthodox, and some Anglicans. Raphael first appears disguised in human form as the travelling companion of Tobit's son, Tobiah, calling himself "Azarias the son of the great Ananias". During the course of the journey the archangel's protective influence is shown in many ways including the binding of a demon in the desert of upper Egypt. After returning and healing the blind Tobit, Azarias makes himself known as "the angel Raphael, one of the seven, who stand before the Lord" Tobit 12:15. He is venerated as Saint Raphael the Archangel. Regarding the healing powers attributed to Raphael, there is his declaration to Tobit (Tobit, 12) that he was sent by the Lord to heal him of his blindness and to deliver Sarah, his future daughter-in-law, from the demon Asmodeus, who kills every man she marries on their wedding night before the marriage can be consummated. In the New Testament, only the archangels Gabriel and Michael are mentioned by name (Luke 1:9–26; Jude 1:9). Later manuscripts of John 5:1–4 refer to the pool of Bethesda, where the multitude of the infirm lay awaiting the moving of the water, for "an angel of the Lord descended at certain times into the pond; and the water was moved. And he that went down first into the pond after the motion of the water was made whole of whatsoever infirmity he lay under". Because of the healing role assigned to Raphael, this particular gift is generally associated with the archangel.





Remember, also, Lord, Your servants and handmaids below who are gone hence before us, marked with the sign of faith, and sleep the sleep of peace. To them, Lord and to all that rest in Christ, grant, we implore You a place of happiness, light and peace through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.
