Some of His disciples therefore said one to another, "What is this He says to us, 'A little while and you shall not see Me, and again a little while, and you shall see Me'; and 'I go to the Father'?" They said therefore: "What is this 'little while' of which He speaks? We do not know what He is saying."

And Jesus knew that they had a mind to ask Him. And He said to them: "Of this do you inquire among yourselves, because I said, 'A little while, and you shall not see Me, and again a little while, and you shall see Me.' Amen, amen, I say to you, that you shall lament and weep, but the world shall rejoice: and you shall be made sorrowful, but your sorrow shall be turned into joy. A woman, when she is in labour, hath sorrow, because her hour is come; but when she hath brought forth the child, she no longer remembers the anguish, for her joy that a man is born into the world. And you therefore have sorrow now; but I will see you again and your heart shall rejoice, and your joy no one shall take from you."

St. Pius V, Pope



Pope from 1566-1572 and one of the foremost leaders of the Catholic Reformation. Born Antonio Ghislieri in Bosco, Italy, to a poor family, he labored as a shepherd until the age of fourteen and then joined the Dominicans, being ordained in 1528.

Called Brother Michele, he studied at Bologna and Genoa, and then taught theology and philosophy for sixteen years before holding the posts of master of novices and prior for several Dominican houses.

Named inquisitor for Como and Bergamo, he was so capable in the fulfillment of his office that by 1551, and at the urging of the powerful Cardinal Carafa, he was named by Pope Julius III commissary general of the Inquisition.

In 1555, Carafa was elected Pope Paul IV and was responsible for Ghislieri's swift rise as a bishop of Nepi and Sutri in 1556, cardinal in 1557, and grand inquisitor in 1558.

While out of favor for a time under Pope Pius IV who disliked his reputation for excessive zeal, Ghislieri was unanimously elected a pope in succession to Pius on January 7, 1566. As pope, Pius saw his main objective as the continuation of the massive program of reform for the Church, in particular the full implementation of the decrees of the Council of Trent.

He published the Roman Catechism, the revised Roman Breviary, and the Roman Missal; he also declared Thomas Aquinas a Doctor of the Church, commanded a new edition of the works of Thomas Aquinas, and created a commission to revise the Vulgate. The decrees of Trent were published throughout all Catholic lands, including Europe, Asia, Africa, and the New World, and the pontiff insisted on their strict adherence.

In 1571, Pius created the Congregation of the Index to give strength to the Church's resistance to Protestant and heretical writings, and he used the Inquisition to prevent any Protestant ideas from gaining a foot hold in Italy.

In dealing with the threat of the Ottoman Turks who were advancing steadily across the Mediterranean, Pius organized a formidable alliance between Venice and Spain, culminating in the Battle of Lepanto, which was a complete and shattering triumph over the Turks. The day of the victory was declared the Feast Day of Our Lady of Victory in recognition of Our Lady's intercession in answer to the saying of the Rosary all over Catholic Europe.

Pius also spurred the reforms of the Church by example. He insisted upon wearing his coarse Dominican robes, even beneath the magnificent vestments worn by the popes, and was wholeheartedly devoted to the religious life.

His reign was blemished only by the continuing oppression of the Inquisition; the often brutal treatment of the Jews of Rome; and the ill-advised decision to excommunicate Queen Elizabeth I of England in February 1570, an act which also declared her deposed and which only worsened the plight of English Catholics.

These were overshadowed in the view of later generations by his contributions to the Catholic Reformation. Pope Clement beatified him on May 1, 1672, and Pope Clement XI canonized him on May 22, 1712.

Commentary: In the Gospel of the Third Sunday after Easter, the risen Christ announces for the first time His approaching departure.

He is to ascend to His Father, but He must leave us behind in the world with all its dangers. However, the Easter spirit and the Easter light will guide us safely through the dangers and trials of our earthly life.

Filled with this Easter spirit, we rejoice at the thought of the departure of Christ, and in spite of the certainty of our separation from Him, we break forth in a joyous Easter song, the Alleluia. "Shout with joy to God all the earth, alleluia; sing ye a psalm to His name, alleluia" (Introit).

Ah, would that we were filled and vivified by this Easter spirit! For that grace we pray in the Kyrie and in the Collect: "O God, . . . grant to all those who profess to be Christians the grace to reject those things which are contrary to that name, and to follow such things as are agreeable to it.

That is the spirit of Easter, the spirit of baptism, whose marvelous power the Epistle explains.

Have we really acquired this spirit? Has Easter really created this spirit and this attitude in our souls? If it has, then the Alleluia verse can be applied to us: "The Lord hath sent redemption to His people." Then we shall have no fear of that which must be true of every Christian: "It behooved Christ to suffer . . . and so to enter into His glory" (Alleluia).

Now Christ speaks in the Gospel: "A little while, and now you shall not see Me; and again, a little while, and you shall see Me. . . . And you shall be made sorrowful, but your sorrow shall be turned into joy."

By means of the Easter spirit we are consoled in the suffering, which results from our being thus left behind. Having the Easter spirit, we know that there will be an eventual victory and an eternal resurrection. Baur



INSTRUCTION ON GOOD WORKS.

- What are good works? All actions of men, which are done according to the will of God, from love of Him, and by the help of grace.
- Which are the principal good works? Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Prayer, including all acts belonging to the service of God; fasting, all mortifications of the body; almsgiving, all works of mercy.
- How many are the works of mercy? Two: corporal and spiritual.
- Which are the spiritual works of mercy? Those which have for their object the salvation of our neighbor; as, 1, to admonish the sinner; 2, to instruct the ignorant; 3, to counsel the doubtful; 4, to comfort the afflicted; 5, to bear wrongs patiently; 6, to forgive injuries and offences; 7, to pray for the living and the dead.
- Which are the corporal works of mercy? 1, To feed the hungry; 2, to give drink to the thirsty; 3, to clothe the naked; 4, to visit the prisoners; 5, to shelter the houseless; 6, to visit the sick; 7, to bury the dead (Matt. xxv. 42, 43).
- What is necessary to render works meritorious? 1, They must be good in themselves; 2, they must be done by the grace of God; 3, in the state of grace; 4, by free will; 5, with the good intention of pleasing God.
- Can we be saved without good works? No, for Christ says expressly, "Every tree that bringeth not good fruit shall be cut down and shall be cast into the fire." And that servant in the Gospel (Matt. xxv. 25) who neither wasted his talent nor yet traded with it but dug it into the earth and hid his lord's money, was thus cast into the outer darkness. Goffine
