Feast of the Holy Family First Sunday After Epiphany

GOSPEL (Luke 2:42-52) And when He was twelve years old, they went up to Jerusalem, according to the custom of the feast. And having fulfilled the days, when they returned, the child Jesus remained in Jerusalem. And His parents knew it not. And thinking that He was in the company, they came a day's journey and sought Him among their kinsfolks and acquaintance. And not finding Him, they returned into Jerusalem, seeking Him. And it came to pass, that, after three days, they found Him in the temple, sitting in the midst of the doctors, hearing them and asking them questions. And all that heard Him were astonished at His wisdom and His answers. And seeing Him, they wondered. And His mother said to Him: "Son, why hast thou done so to us? Behold thy father and I have sought thee sorrowing." And He said to them: "How is it that you sought Me? Did you not know that I must be about My Father's business?"

And they understood not the word that He spoke unto them. And He went down with them and came to Nazareth and was subject to them. And His mother kept all these words in her heart. And Jesus advanced in wisdom and age and grace with God and men.



At this time of year when families are re-united again and as we celebrate The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph, we reflect on what it is to be a family. The family is the basic unit of society and the Church. It is in the family that we first learn to communicate, and that we learn what is good and bad. It is in the family that we learn what love is because it is in the family that we first receive love. It is in the family that we first learn to forgive and to pray. It is in the family that we first learn about God and Jesus and Our Lady. It is in the family that we learn to value ourselves and to value everything else, picking up our values from what is said and unsaid by our parents. Our family forms us for many years to come. The future of humanity depends on the family because it is through a family that we all come. There are many attempts to destroy the family in our times and if the family

will be destroyed in western society, the western world will crumble because all humanity comes through the family. There are many attempts today to redefine the family, but they do not reflect God's plan.

Is our family fulfilling God's plan? We desire our families to be the best possible families for our children so that they may get the best possible start in life. It is important to reflect on how our family fulfills God's plan because the family we grow up in influences us for the rest of our lives. When families reflect God's plan, they are mighty.

What is God's plan for the family? What does Jesus say about the family? In Matt 19:4-6 Jesus says, "Have you not read that the Creator from the beginning made them male and female and that he said: This is why a man leaves his father and mother and becomes attached to his wife, and the two become one flesh? They are no longer two therefore, but one flesh. So then, what God has united, human beings must not divide."

These are very clear words from Jesus on God's plan for the family. It is a man and woman who become one flesh and what God has united man must not divide.

What else has God revealed to us about his plan for the family? In the letter to the Ephesians we read that husbands are to love their wives as much as Christ loved the Church (5:25). How much did Jesus love the Church? He loved the Church so much that he died for the Church. That is how husbands are to love their wives according to the letter to the Ephesians; husbands are to love their wives as Christ loved the Church. The letter also says husbands are to love their wives as much as they love their own bodies (5:28). And then the letter goes on to say something beautiful, it says the love of husband and wife for each other is a reflection of the love of Christ for the Church (5:32). So, husbands and wives, is your love for each other a reflection of the unselfish love of Christ for the Church? That part of the Letter to the Ephesians is a beautiful description of God's plan for the family.

What else do we know about God's plan for the family? What about parents and children? Again, the same letter to the Ephesians states, "Children be obedient to your parents in the Lord - that is what uprightness demands." (6:1) Children, do you always love your parents? Sometimes we are given the impression that the fourth commandment has been rewritten and now states that parents are to obey their children. Then the letter goes on to say, "Parents, never drive your children to resentment." (6:4) So once again we find beautiful words in the Letter to the Ephesians about God's plan for the family.

If our families are to be families reflecting God's plan, then they will also be families that put God first. So, do you turn off the TV every night to pray together as a family? The letter to the Colossians (3:16) says, "Let the message of Christ in all its richness find a home with you." If faith in God is not what motivates a family, that family is starting with a disadvantage. Put Jesus in the center of your family, "Let the message of Christ in all its richness find a home with you." Fr. T Lane


- Volunteers needed to take down the Christmas decorations after the 9:00am Mass on Saturday, January 15th.

THE LITURGICAL YEAR



As we follow this yearly round of feasts and seasons in our Missal, the Life of Jesus Christ, our Savior, unfolds in His Incarnation, Birth, Labors, Passion, Death, Resurrection and his unceasing Presence and Operations as the Head of the Mystical Body. Those who enter into the spirit of the different seasons of the Liturgical Year, will surely live holier and happier lives on earth and enjoy greater glory in heaven.

The Roman Catholic Church sets aside certain days and seasons of each year to recall and celebrate various events in the life of Christ.

In its Roman Rite the liturgical year begins with Advent, the time of preparation for both the celebration of Jesus' birth, and his expected second coming at the end of time. This season lasts until Christmas Eve on December 24th. Christmastide follows, beginning with First Vespers of Christmas on the evening of December 24th and ending with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord.

Traditionally, the end of Christmastide was February 2nd, or the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, also known as Candlemas. This feast recounts the 40 days of rest Mary took before being purified and presenting her first-born son to the Temple in Jerusalem.

Lent is the period of purification and penance that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Thursday. The Holy Thursday evening Mass of the Lord's Supper marks the beginning of the Easter Triduum, which includes Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Sunday. The days of the Easter Triduum recall Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples, death on the cross, burial, and resurrection.

The seven-week liturgical season of Easter immediately follows the Triduum, ending at Pentecost. This last feast recalls the descent of the Holy Ghost upon Jesus' disciples after the Ascension of Jesus.

The rest of the liturgical year is known as Time after Pentecost.

January is the month of The Child Jesus ~ Did you know that each month has a traditional Catholic devotion? Refer to your Traditional Catholic Calendar to make yourself notes, write it on your calendar, and pray a specific prayer each day of the month to remember. You could use a prayer already associated with the devotion or pray a personal one.

This month is January, which is dedicated to His Holy Name and His Holy Childhood. Liturgically, this makes sense because we just celebrated Jesus' birth and continue to celebrate the season of Christmas! His Holy Childhood is important because Christ is fully human and fully God, which is a core belief of our faith.
