Twenty Third Sunday After Pentecost

GOSPEL Matt. 9:18-26 At that time, as Jesus was speaking these things unto them, behold a certain ruler came up, and adored Him, saying: "Lord, my daughter is even now dead; but come, lay Thy hand upon her, and she shall live." And Jesus rising up followed him, with His disciples.

St. Frances Xavier Cabrini



St. Frances Xavier Cabrini was born as Maria Francesca Cabrini on July 15, 1850 in Lombardy, Italy. She was born two months premature and the youngest of thirteen children. Frances would live most of her life in a fragile and delicate state of health. She dedicated her life to religious work from a young age and received a convent education at a school ran by the Daughters of the Sacred Heart. She graduated with high honors and a teaching certificate.

When Frances was 18, she applied for admission to the religious congregation of the Daughters of the Sacred Heart but was turned down because of her poor health. Instead, a priest asked her to teach at the House of Providence Orphanage. In 1877, she became Mother Cabrini after she finally made her vows and took the religious habit, also adding Xavier to her name in honor of St. Francis Xavier.

When the House of Providence Orphanage closed, her bishop asked her to found the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart to care for the poor children in both schools and hospitals. In its first five years, the institute established seven homes and a free school and nursery. Frances wanted to continue her mission in China, but Pope Leo XIII urged her to go to the United States, a nation that was becoming flooded with Italian immigrants who needed her help.

On March 31, 1889, Frances arrived in New York City. Right from the beginning she encountered many disappointments and hardships. The house originally intended for her new orphanage was no longer available. Archbishop Michael Corrigan found them housing with the convent of the Sisters of Charity. Frances then received permission to found an orphanage in what is now West Park, New York and now known as Saint Cabrini Home.

Filled with a deep trust in God and endowed with a wonderful administrative ability, Frances founded 67 institutions, including orphanages, schools, and hospitals, within 35 years dedicated to caring for the poor, uneducated, sick, abandoned, and especially for the Italian immigrants. Her institutions were spread out in places all over the United States, including New York, Colorado, and Illinois.

In 1909, Frances became a naturalized citizen of the United States. Eight years later, on December 22, 1917, Frances passed at the age of 67, at the Columbus Hospital, one of her own hospitals, in Chicago, Illinois.

Frances' body was originally placed at the Saint Cabrini Home but was exhumed in 1931 as part of her canonization process. St. Frances Xavier Cabrini was beatified on November 13, 1938, by Pope Pius XI and canonized by Pope Pius XII on July 7, 1946, making her the first United States citizen to be canonized. Her feast day is celebrated on November 13th.

FATHER SAFREED'S REFLECTIONS

Last week we began our discussion of the discipline of Philosophy by pointing out that it all began with the ability of men and women to possess a sense of wonder. Because of this, we end up asking the great questions of life when inundated with the beauty that surrounds us. Questions also come to mind when faced with pain, misfortune and loss—in other words the Problem of Evil. This is part of what philosophy does: it attempts to grapple with life and the questions that come upon us. In this, philosophy attempts to make sense out of life as we experience it, and how we might best regulate our lives. So, what are some of those questions? Let's start with these:

- [1] What is happiness? [2] What is the purpose or meaning of life?
- [3] What is justice? [4] What is love? [5] How can we know?

To we who are Catholic, these questions may seem silly or even ridiculous. But in point of fact, they really are important. First of all, we must make a distinction between what might be called "natural" knowledge, and that which is "revealed," or supernatural knowledge. Revelations are things that we would not otherwise know, unless God had revealed them.

Take for example the existence of God himself. It has been the conviction of most philosophers in history—starting at least with Aristotle—that the human person can come to the conviction that there is a God, utilizing human reason alone. By the fact that there is something, there must be a being that is responsible for that something. This only makes sense. On the other hand the fact that God is Triune, that he is three persons in one God, is something that had to be revealed, otherwise we would never have known it on this earth.

Philosophy stays on the level of the natural. It's common for people to want to stray into faith and theology when talking with others or attempting to convert a person to the faith. But when talking philosophy, we stay within the bounds of its own method—that is the tool of reason, that will hopefully bring us to wisdom. We don't deal directly with Revelation.

So, let's take the question: What is happiness? If you were to ask students in a classroom, one would get all kinds of responses, depending upon their ages, whether they were male or female, the culture they come from, etc. Their responses would almost always be what they consider happiness is on the natural level.

But the question is tricky. I may think that winning a million dollars in the lottery would make me happy. But if 5 years from now I've spent all of it, even gotten into debt, maybe even become drug addicted, happiness now alludes me by my own doing. This can be a discussion that a person can have with most anyone on a natural and philosophical level. This is part of what makes us above the animals— we can reflect on these abstract ideas, and often come to a consensus about them. So, philosophy can help us make choices out of Wisdom, rather than self-destruction — even before we bring up the things of God.





Remember, also, Lord, Your servants and handmaids below who are gone hence before us, marked with the sign of faith, and sleep the sleep of peace. To them, Lord and to all that rest in Christ, grant, we implore You a place of happiness, light and peace through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.
