GOSPEL Matt. 24:15-35 At that time, Jesus said to His disciples: "When therefore you shall see the abomination of desolation, which was spoken of by Daniel the prophet, standing in the holy place: let him who reads understand. Then they that are in Judea, let them flee to the mountains: And he that is on the housetop, let him not come down to take anything out of his house: And he that is in the field, let him not go back to take his coat. And woe to them that are with child and that give suck in those days. But pray that your flight be not in the winter or on the sabbath. For there shall be then great tribulation, such as hath not been from the beginning of the world until now, neither shall be. And unless those days had been shortened, no flesh should be saved: but for the sake of the elect those days shall be shortened.

Then if any man shall say to you, 'Lo here is Christ,' or 'there': do not believe him. For there shall arise false christs and false prophets and shall show great signs and wonders, insomuch as to deceive (if possible) even the elect. Behold I have told it to you, beforehand. If therefore they shall say to you, 'Behold he is in the desert': go ye not out. 'Behold he is in the closets': believe it not. For as lightning comes forth from the east and shines even to the west: so, also will the coming of the Son of Man be. Wheresoever the body shall be, there shall the eagles also be gathered together.

And immediately after the tribulation of those days, the sun shall be darkened, and the moon shall not give her light and the stars shall fall from heaven and the powers of heaven shall be moved. And then shall appear the sign of the Son of Man in heaven. And then shall all tribes of the earth mourn: and they shall see the Son of Man coming in the clouds of heaven with much power and majesty. And He shall send His angels with a trumpet and a great voice: and they shall gather together His elect from the four winds, from the farthest parts of the heavens to the utmost bounds of them.

And from the fig tree learn a parable: When the branch thereof is now tender and the leaves come forth, you know that summer is nigh. So, you also, when you shall see all these things, know ye that it is nigh, even at the doors. Amen, I say to you that this generation shall not pass till all these things be done. Heaven and earth shall pass: but My words shall not pass."

St. JOHN OF THE CROSS

Saint John of the Cross

Saint John of the Cross was born Juan de Yepes y Alvarez, in Avila, Spain in 1542. In 1563, he joined the Carmelite Order and was sent to the university in Salamanca to study theology and philosophy.

John became a priest in 1567 and he encountered Theresa of Avila, a charismatic Carmelite nun. Theresa asked John to follow her. On November 28, 1568, Theresa founded a new monastery.

The same day, John changed his name to John of the Cross.

In 1572, John traveled to Avila at the invitation of Theresa to become her confessor and spiritual guide. While there, he had a vision of Christ and made a drawing that remains to this day called, "Christ from Above." The little drawing shows Christ on the cross, looking down on him from above. The image has been preserved for centuries.

Around 1575, a rift within the Carmelite order began to grow and create controversy between various monastic houses. On December 2, 1577, a group of Carmelites broke into John's residence and kidnapped him. He was taken by force to the order's main house in Toledo. He was brought before a court and placed on trial for disobedience. He was punished by imprisonment.

A cell was made for him in the monastery that was so small he could barely lie on the floor. He was fed only bread and water, and occasional scraps of salt fish. Each week he was taken into public and lashed, then returned to his cell. His only luxuries were a prayer book and an oil lamp to read it by. To pass the time he wrote poems on paper that was smuggled to him by the friar charged with guarding his cell.

John became known as a remarkable and influential poet, especially following his death. He has been cited as an influence to many poets, mystics, and artists, even Salvador Dali.

In 1591, John became ill with a skin condition that resulted in an infection and died.

Saint John of the Cross was beatified by Pope Clement X in 1675 and Canonized by Pope Benedict XIII in 1726. His feast day is November 24th. The Catholic Church distinguishes him as one of the 36 Doctors of the Church.

FATHER SAFREED'S REFLECTIONS

TRUTH, BEAUTY AND GOODNESS

Philosophers, if they be true to their vocation, sooner or later must deal with what are known as the Transcendentals, namely Truth, Beauty and Goodness.

They ask the questions—[1] what is Real, [2] what is lovely or Beautiful, and [3] what is Right.

The Transcendentals are closely aligned with each other. When civilizations have a high regard for Truth, then what will follow is a high regard for Beauty and Goodness.

In our time, however, it has become very evident that people have degenerated into a condition where such considerations are alien to their thinking. Such ideas don't even occur to them. This has happened, in part I think, because most everyone today defines Truth, Beauty and Goodness in a totally subjective manner. They view it as an affront to themselves to refer to anything outside of themselves. If I think it is true, then it must be so says the modern person, without regard for what anyone else says, even Saints and great thinkers.

But the Transcendentals are timeless and universal attributes of being. All things that exist have the properties of Truth, Beauty and Goodness to some degree. Even in Hell, in some fashion, these things must exist. Wouldn't that make for an interesting discussion...?

When I was away in Michigan, I picked up a book on Philosophy written by a contemporary philosopher. I looked for any real discussion of Truth, Beauty and Goodness, and found that these things were not even acknowledged, as such. Here modern people run away, because the Transcendentals do inevitably lead to a discussion and a belief in God. God as a reality, and not just as a theory for students to bat around in a classroom situation.

TRUTH: We are created by God to know the truth. Classically considered, the definition of truth is the mind being in accord with reality. We are obliged to come to know the truth, especially the truth as God has revealed in nature, and in His public revelation—Sacred Scripture, Sacred Tradition, and the true pre-Vatican II Magisterium. For this we will be judged.

BEAUTY: Something that is beautiful, especially in the world of art, possesses UNITY, PROPORTION and SPLENDOR. Unity maintains the integrity of art, by discarding that which is alien to its purpose. Proportion keeps everything in balance — these two things give forth splendor. As I listened to some of Bach's Brandenburg Concertos this morning, his genius is manifest in that Unity, Proportion and therefore Splendor are evident, in spite of variations within the compositions themselves.

GOODNESS: Our wills were created to do good. Deep inside we know when we are close to goodness, and when we have "missed the mark."

Thus, the Transcendentals can bring us close to God, who doesn't simply possess these qualities, but IS Truth, Beauty and Goodness itself.
