
Eleventh Sunday After Pentecost

GOSPEL Mark 7:31-37 At that time, Jesus went out from the borders of Tyre, and came through Sidon unto the sea of Galilee, through the midst of the district of Decapolis. And they brought to Him one that was deaf and had an impediment in his speech; and they beseeched Him to lay His hand upon him. And He took him aside from the multitude privately, and put His fingers into his ears, and He spat, and touched his tongue; and looking up to heaven, He sighed, and saith unto him, "Ephphatha," that is, "Be opened." And his ears were opened, and the bond of his tongue was loosed, and he began to speak correctly. And He charged them to tell no man. But the more He charged them, so much the more a great deal they published it. And they were beyond measure astonished, saying, "He hath done all things well. He made the deaf to hear, and the dumb to speak."



The month of August is dedicated to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. On October 31, 1942, Pope Pius XII made a solemn Act of Consecration of the Church and the whole world to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The Immaculate Heart is often venerated together with the Sacred Heart of Jesus (the devotion we celebrate in June) and, with good reason. Just as the Sacred Heart represents Christ's love for mankind, the Immaculate Heart represents the desire of the Blessed Virgin to bring all people to her Son.

There is no better example of the Christian life than that offered by Mary. We do not worship Mary or place her above Christ, but we come to Christ through Mary, as Christ came to us through her.



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The dogma of the Assumption of Mary has its roots in the early centuries of the Church.

The Catholic Church teaches that when Mary ended her earthly life, God assumed her, body and soul into heaven.

This belief traces its roots back to the earliest years of the Church. While a site outside of Jerusalem was recognized as the tomb of Mary, the earliest Christians maintained that "no one was there".

According to St. John of Damascus, in the 5th century, at the Council of Chalcedon in 451, Roman Emperor Marcian requested the body of Mary, Mother of God. St. Juvenal, who was Bishop of Jerusalem replied

"that Mary died in the presence of all the Apostles, but that her tomb, when opened upon the request of St. Thomas, was found empty; wherefrom the Apostles concluded that the body was taken up to heaven," the saint recorded.

By the 8th century, around the time of Pope Adrian, the Church began to change its terminology, renaming the feast day of the Memorial of Mary to the Assumption of Mary.

The belief in the Assumption of Mary was a widely held tradition, and a frequent meditation in the writings of saints throughout the centuries. However, it was not defined officially until the past century. In 1950, Pope Pius XII made an infallible, ex-cathedra statement in the Apostolic Constitution Munificentissimus Deus officially defining the dogma of the Assumption.

The pope wrote, "By the authority of our Lord Jesus Christ, of the Blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, and by our own authority, we pronounce, declare, and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma: that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory."

Tuesday, August 15th is the Feast of the Assumption which marks a major feast day and a public holiday in many countries. In most countries, including the United States, it is a Holy Day of Obligation.

FATHER SAFREED'S REFLECTIONS

FORMING A NEW COUNTERFEIT CHURCH III

Continuing with "Vatican II Exposed as Counterfeit Catholicism" by Frs. Francisco and Dominic Radecki, CMRI:

The ultimate goal of Freemasonry is to destroy the Catholic Church and create a society free from God. On May 1, 1776, Adam Weishaupt, founded a secret society called the **Illuminati** to bring down "the corrupt Catholic Church," and establish in its stead a godless, humanistic, New World Order. They are Satan's agents, responsible to a great degree for the secularization of society and the changes of belief and worship mandated by Vatican II. Devastating effects of Freemasonry on society are disbelief, moral relativity, rebellion against authority, and indifference or hatred towards God, the commandments, and Church teaching. A letter by Piccolo Tigre (Little Tiger) of 1822, said: "...It is of absolute necessity to de-Catholicize the world...The Revolution in the Church is the Revolution *en permanence*."

Freemasonic and Communist leaders encouraged members to infiltrate the Church in return for fame or power. They made devastating changes that shook the Church to its foundation.

At Caudebec [France] fifteen out of eighty members of the lodge were priests; at Sens [France], twenty out of fifty. Canons and parish priests sat in the Venerable Assembly, while the Cistercians of Clairvaux had a lodge in the very walls of their monastery. Saurine, the future bishop of Strasbourg under Napoleon, was among the governing members of the Grand Orient.

We cannot be far from the truth in suggesting that towards the year 1789 a quarter of French Freemasons were churchmen...

With dedicated members around the world, infiltration of the Catholic Church was not as difficult as it may appear. During the twentieth century, a number of bishops and cardinals were [alleged] Freemasons including Rampolla, Roncalli (John XXIII), Lienart, Bugnini, Villot, Suenens, Baggio, and Casaroli. These men, and others from around the world, worked tirelessly to achieve the Freemasonic goal of creating a New Church from the chaos caused by Vatican II.

Loyalty to the Lodge supersedes fidelity to God and family.

Freemasons worked tirelessly to get one of their own to occupy the Throne of Peter to destroy the Church from within. Yves Marsaudon, a member of the Supreme Council of France, Scottish Rite Freemasonry, said, "the goal is no longer the destruction of the Church, but to make use of it by infiltrating it." The *Vente Supreme* of the Carbonari taught, "Our final object and aim is that of Voltaire and the French Revolution: The Total Annihilation forever of Catholicity and of all ideas of Christianity." 33rd degree Freemason, Albert Lantoine, wrote a pamphlet called *A Letter to the Sovereign Pontiff* stating:

We are freethinkers—you are believers. Freemasonry seeks to exalt man; the Church to exalt God. **We are the servants of Satan.** You, the guardians of truth, are the servants of God.





Remember, also, Lord, Your servants and handmaids below who are gone hence before us, marked with the sign of faith, and sleep the sleep of peace. To them, Lord and to all that rest in Christ, grant, we implore You a place of happiness, light and peace through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.
