Transfiguration of the Lord

GOSPEL Matt. 17:1-9 At that time Jesus took Peter and James, and John his brother, and led them up a high mountain by themselves, and was transfigured before them. And His face did shine as the sun: and His garments became white as snow. And behold, there appeared to them Moses and Elias talking with Him. And Peter answering, said to Jesus: "Lord, it is good for us to be here: if You will, let us make here three tabernacles, one for You, and one for Moses, and one for Elias." And as he was still speaking, behold a bright cloud overshadowed them, and behold, a voice out of the cloud, said: "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased: hear Him." And the disciples hearing fell upon their faces and were very much afraid. And Jesus came and touched them: and said to them: "Arise, and fear not." But lifting up their eyes, saw no one, but only Jesus. And as they came down from the mountain, Jesus charged them, saying: "Tell the vision to no one, till the Son of man has risen from the dead."



THE TRANSFIGURATION. The Gospel of Luke adds an interesting detail: Moses and Elijah had been speaking with Jesus “of his exodus that he was going to accomplish in Jerusalem.” His exodus? That loaded word points back to the sometimes-arduous journey of following Jesus, and that’s what the transfiguration is about. It’s wonderful to find inspiration in a shining vision of Jesus, but the message to the Church then and now is that witnessing glory is one thing, following is another. After the vision is over, you look up and see, as the apostles did, “Jesus only,” and you realize that, to get to the further glory of eternal life, you have to follow him to the cross. Bauer



St. Dominic ~ Truth was St. Dominic’s motto and his goal. He was born in Spain, (8 August 1170 – 6 August 1221) the youngest of four children. He was educated by his uncle, a priest. St. Dominic became a priest and joined a religious community. Soon he became the prior, or head.

St. Dominic might have lived his whole life in that monastery if he had not gone with his bishop to northern Europe in 1204. As they traveled, St. Dominic saw that many people were following heretics, or false teachers. St. Dominic, his bishop, and three Cistercian monks went from city to city preaching the truth of Christ, using the Bible. They went on foot, depending on others for food and a place to sleep. Soon people returned to the faith—not only because of what these preachers said, but because of how they lived.

By 1215 a few men had joined St. Dominic in his work of preaching. He founded the Order of Preachers, better known as the Dominicans. He urged his members to study and to pray. Then they would be ready to preach. St. Dominic realized that to be true witnesses of the Gospel, Dominicans could not be wealthy. His followers also deeply loved the Blessed Virgin Mary and spread devotion to her through the rosary.

St. Dominic’s community was different from most because his friars traveled and preached instead of staying in their monastery. His order tried to reach the well-educated who were deceived by heresy, while the Franciscans went to the poor and uneducated.

St. Dominic fell ill with fever while he was on a preaching mission through northern Italy, he died, only six years after he had founded his community.

St. Dominic was able to draw the members of this community together and inspire them to love and forgive one another.

He was outstanding for his love of truth, his clear thought, his organizing ability, and his sensitive, loving nature.

For St. Dominic, love for people was part of his love for God.

Under the authority of Pope Gregory IX, Dominic was canonized in 1234 and his feast day is August 4th. St. Dominic is the patron saint of astronomers, the Dominican Republic, and the innocent who are falsely accused of crimes. He is commonly depicted in icons with a dog, or lilies, holding a book.

FATHER SAFREED'S REFLECTIONS

FORMING A NEW COUNTERFEIT CHURCH II

We continue with another excerpt from "Vatican II Exposed as Counterfeit Catholicism" by Frs. Francisco and Dominic Radecki, CMRI:

During the last three centuries, enemies of God, led by Satan, attacked the Church from within and without by introducing false doctrines called heresies into Catholic seminaries, convents, rectories, parishes and schools to destroy faith. After hundreds of years of careful planning, evil masterminds formed a Counterfeit Church. Satan replaced truth with error, virtue with vice and began a moral and doctrinal revolution based on half-truths. Pope St. Pius X compared false doctrines to poison.

A handful of people in a control tower manage an entire airport. A well-organized coup d'etat causes confusion and disorder. Revolutions dismantle institutions and replace them with others. Through a false sense of obedience, millions of Catholics blindly accepted new beliefs taught at Vatican II. Others in good faith, were misled as false beliefs engulfed the world.

FORMIDABLE ENEMIES OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

[1] Freemasonry

Freemasonry [in the modern era] was formed during a meeting at Apple Tree Tavern in London, England on December 27, 1716, and spread to Mons, Belgium (1721), Paris, France (1725) and to North America (1728). By 1773, Grand Master Louis Philippe of d'Orleans, (1774-1793) presided over 600 lodges of the Grand Orient of France. Fifty years later, the Grand Orient of France had 18,000 members while the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry had 6,000.

Freemasons use secret passwords and masonic symbols such as the pyramid, rule, compass and apron, and religious symbols from Christianity, Judaism, Islam, Eastern Religions, Wicca, and ancient Egyptian, Grecian and Roman pagan religions. Shriners' Hospitals, circuses and clowns / motorcycle shows help disguise the real mission of Freemasonry. Many of the two million North American Freemasons and three million Freemasons throughout the rest of the world do not know of the secret work carried out by those in higher degrees.

Pope Leo XIII wrote: "For if they were not acting wickedly, they would not have such great hate for light...avoid entirely men who consider light darkness, and darkness light." Freemasons take secret blood oaths as they advance in 33 degrees, swearing they will never reveal to anyone, under pain of death, what occurs at Masonic Lodges. Lodge members revere the Grand Architect of the Universe, Lucifer who guides them.
