Twenty Fourth Sunday After Pentecost

GOSPEL Matt. 13:24-30 At that time, Jesus spoke this parable to the multitudes: "The kingdom of heaven is likened to a man that sowed good seed in his field. But while men were asleep, his enemy came and sowed cockle among the wheat, and went away. And when the blade sprung up, and had brought forth fruit, then appeared also the cockle. And the servants of the good man of the house coming, said to him, Sir, did you not sow good seed in thy field? how then does it have cockle? And he said to them, an enemy has done this. And the servants said to him, Will you have us go and gather it up? And he said, No: lest perhaps gathering up the cockle you root up the wheat also together with it. Let both grow until the harvest; and in the time of the harvest, I will say to the reapers, gather up first the cockle, and bind it into bundles to burn, but the wheat gather into my barn."

St. Frances Xavier Cabrini



St. Frances Xavier Cabrini was born as Maria Francesca Cabrini on July 15, 1850 in Lombardy, Italy. She was born two months premature and the youngest of thirteen children. Frances would live most of her life in a fragile and delicate state of health. She dedicated her life to religious work from a young age and received a convent education at a school ran by the Daughters of the Sacred Heart. She graduated with high honors and a teaching certificate.

When Frances was 18, she applied for admission to the religious congregation of the Daughters of the Sacred Heart but was turned down because of her poor health. Instead, a priest asked her to teach at the House of Providence Orphanage. In 1877, she became Mother Cabrini after she finally made her vows and took the religious habit, also adding Xavier to her name in honor of St. Francis Xavier.

When the House of Providence Orphanage closed, her bishop asked her to found the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart to care for the poor children in both schools and hospitals. In its first five years, the institute established seven homes and a free school and nursery. Frances wanted to continue her mission in China, but Pope Leo XIII urged her to go to the United States, a nation that was becoming flooded with Italian immigrants who needed her help.

On March 31, 1889, Frances arrived in New York City. Right from the beginning she encountered many disappointments and hardships. The house originally intended for her new orphanage was no longer available. Archbishop Michael Corrigan found them housing with the convent of the Sisters of Charity. Frances then received permission to found an orphanage in what is now West Park, New York and now known as Saint Cabrini Home.

Filled with a deep trust in God and endowed with a wonderful administrative ability, Frances founded 67 institutions, including orphanages, schools, and hospitals, within 35 years dedicated to caring for the poor, uneducated, sick, abandoned, and especially for the Italian immigrants. Her institutions were spread out in places all over the United States, including New York, Colorado, and Illinois.

In 1909, Frances became a naturalized citizen of the United States. Eight years later, on December 22, 1917, Frances passed at the age of 67, at the Columbus Hospital, one of her own hospitals, in Chicago, Illinois.

Frances' body was originally placed at the Saint Cabrini Home but was exhumed in 1931 as part of her canonization process. St. Frances Xavier Cabrini was beatified on November 13, 1938, by Pope Pius XI and canonized by Pope Pius XII on July 7, 1946, making her the first United States citizen to be canonized. Her feast day is celebrated on November 13th.

FATHER SAFREED'S REFLECTIONS

THE THIRD SECRET OF FATIMA III

We continue with our consideration of the Third Secret of Fatima, which even as a private revelation seems to have a high degree of probability as to its veracity.

The next part of the secret says:

"Many will lose the Faith; confusion will reign everywhere. The sheep will search for their shepherds in vain."

Before Vatican II (1962-65) an astounding 80% of American Catholics went to Mass every week. Presently, as of 2022, at best only 25% of Novus Ordo adherents attend what they think is the Mass. In Europe the numbers are even worse. If you were to ask the typical New Order catholic what the faith is, you would probably receive an answer based upon feelings and personal impressions, rather than something formulated by dogma and the catechism. I've heard it said for decades: people in general and the younger generations in particular simply don't know the Faith. All of this mirrors what the Secret says: **"that many will lose the Faith."**

The loss of faith even among Church officials has created massive confusion. **"...confusion will reign everywhere."** This confusion has come about because official teachers—those who have set themselves up as experts in the Church—don't even agree on the basics of the Faith, let alone on finer but no less important points.

Who's understanding of the Faith do we go with? Pope St. Pius X, John XXIII, Paul VI, John Paul II, Francis Bergoglio? How about the Society of St. Pius X? The Fraternity of St. Peter? CMRI? Taylor Marshall or Michael Voris? All of these differ, often on major points. **This kind of disunity was unheard of 60 or 70 years ago.** It has come about because of John XXIII's "wicked council" spoken of by the Third Secret.

"The sheep will search for their shepherds in vain"

This can be understood from two aspects. (1) that the bishops and clergy in general don't agree as to what the Faith is; and (2) the men who call themselves bishops and priests are not valid in the Catholic sense because the new ordinal promulgated in 1968 rendered holy orders invalid in the Novus Ordo church. So from the perspective of doctrinal orthodoxy and their actual reality as true bishops and priests—able to confect the sacraments validly—these men are false. Therefore the Secret is correct again: the sheep have searched in vain for their [true] shepherds.
