Twenty Sixth and Last Sunday After Pentecost

GOSPEL Matt. 24:15-35 At that time, Jesus said to His disciples: "When therefore you shall see the abomination of desolation, which was spoken of by Daniel the prophet, standing in the holy place: let him who reads understand.

Then they that are in Judea, let them flee to the mountains: And he that is on the housetop, let him not come down to take anything out of his house: And he that is in the field, let him not go back to take his coat. And woe to them that are with child and that give suck in those days. But pray that your flight be not in the winter or on the sabbath. For there shall be then great tribulation, such as hath not been from the beginning of the world until now, neither shall be. And unless those days had been shortened, no flesh should be saved: but for the sake of the elect those days shall be shortened.

Then if any man shall say to you, 'Lo here is Christ,' or 'there': do not believe him. For there shall arise false christs and false prophets and shall show great signs and wonders, insomuch as to deceive (if possible) even the elect. Behold I have told it to you, beforehand. If therefore they shall say to you, 'Behold he is in the desert': go ye not out. 'Behold he is in the closets': believe it not. For as lightning comes forth from the east and shines even to the west: so, also will the coming of the Son of Man be. Wheresoever the body shall be, there shall the eagles also be gathered together.

And immediately after the tribulation of those days, the sun shall be darkened, and the moon shall not give her light and the stars shall fall from heaven and the powers of heaven shall be moved. And then shall appear the sign of the Son of Man in heaven. And then shall all tribes of the earth mourn: and they shall see the Son of Man coming in the clouds of heaven with much power and majesty. And He shall send His angels with a trumpet and a great voice: and they shall gather together His elect from the four winds, from the farthest parts of the heavens to the utmost bounds of them.

And from the fig tree learn a parable: When the branch thereof is now tender and the leaves come forth, you know that summer is nigh. So, you also, when you shall see all these things, know ye that it is nigh, even at the doors. Amen, I say to you that this generation shall not pass till all these things be done. Heaven and earth shall pass: but My words shall not pass."



Saint Nicholas (5 March 270 – 6 December 343), also known as Nicholas of Bari, was an early Christian bishop of the ancient Greek maritime city of Myra in Asia Minor (modern-day Demre, Turkey) during the time of the Roman Empire. Because of the many miracles attributed to his intercession, he is also known as Nicholas the Wonderworker.

Very little is known about the historical Saint Nicholas. The earliest accounts of his life were written centuries after his death and contain many legendary elaborations. He is said to have been born in the Greek seaport of Patara, Lycia in Asia Minor to wealthy Christian parents. In one of the earliest attested and most famous incidents from his life, he is said to have rescued three girls from being forced into prostitution by dropping a sack of gold coins through the window of their house each night for three nights so their father could pay a dowry for each of them.

Other early stories tell of him calming a storm at sea, saving three innocent soldiers from wrongful execution, and chopping down a tree possessed by a demon.

In his youth, he is said to have made a pilgrimage to Egypt and the Palestine area. Shortly after his return, he became Bishop of Myra. He was later cast into prison during the persecution of Diocletian but was released after the accession of Constantine.

An early list makes him an attendee at the First Council of Nicaea in 325, but he is never mentioned in any writings by people who were actually at the council. Late, unsubstantiated legends claim that he was temporarily defrocked and imprisoned during the Council for slapping the heretic Arius.

Fewer than 200 years after Nicholas's death, the St. Nicholas Church was built in Myra under the orders of Theodosius II over the site of the church, where he had served as bishop and Nicholas's remains were moved to a sarcophagus in that church. In 1087, while the Greek Christian inhabitants of the region were subjugated by the newly arrived Muslim Seljuk Turks, and soon after their church was declared to be in schism by the Catholic church, a group of merchants from the Italian city of Bari removed the major bones of Nicholas's skeleton from his sarcophagus in the church without authorization and brought them to their hometown, where they are now enshrined in the Basilica di San Nicola.

The remaining bone fragments from the sarcophagus were later removed by Venetian sailors and taken to Venice during the First Crusade. His relics in Bari are said to exude a miraculous watery substance known as "manna" or "myrrh", which some members of the faithful regard as possessing supernatural powers.

Saint Nicholas is the patron saint of sailors, merchants, archers, repentant thieves, prostitutes, children, brewers, pawnbrokers, and students in various cities and countries around Europe.

His reputation evolved among the faithful, as was common for early Christian saints, and his legendary habit of secret gift-giving gave rise to the traditional model of Santa Claus ("Saint Nick") through Sinterklaas.

FATHER SAFREED'S REFLECTIONS

"IN THE END MY IMMACULATE HEART WILL TRIUMPH"

The Third Secret of Fatima concludes with these sentiments:

The Church will bleed from all Her wounds. Happy are they who will persevere and search for refuge in My Heart, because in the end my Immaculate Heart will triumph.

The Church will bleed from all of Her wounds. This is an allusion to the Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ who bled at His crucifixion and death from all of His wounds. What one says therefore, about Christ in His physical body, is extended to what is happening in His Mystical Body. The Church is undergoing its death mystically. After all, "the servant is not greater than his Master." What Christ endured, all of us united with him must endure in some fashion. The question is: do we really have love for the Cross and the Church—or are we only going through the motions of religiosity in our lives—merely seeking out "fire-protection?"

About our role in the Mystical Body the late Michael Cain states:

Just as there are only a few standing with the True Mystical Body of Christ today, there were only a few who still stood with Christ through His darkest hour of humanity. We know who they were from holy writ, a number you can count on one hand...His most Blessed Mother Mary, St. John the Beloved Disciple, St. Mary Magdalen, a women identified as Salome, and another Mary, and apparently Joseph of Arimathea.

Yes, the faithful few have reached Calvary...The war has brought us to its peak. Not many are willing to go that far. That is the mark of grace: to go forward into the valley of death—without fear of man, but out of love for God, without shame for what the world thinks.

There are a number of ways that this can be understood, but I see it as an admonishment to live a contemplative life, largely cloistered away from the world in general and the Novus Ordo church in particular—without looking back as did Lot's wife who turned into a pillar of salt.

"In the End My Immaculate Heart Will Triumph!"

God to the Serpent after the sin of Adam and Eve: "I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; he will strike at your head, while you strike at his heel."

This passage has contained within it an implied victory over all the evil we face in our times. In a mysterious manner, Christ along with the New Eve, the Mother of God, will restore all things in Christ, which will most likely reach it's fulfillment at the Second Coming of Jesus Christ at the End of Time. And what a glorious time that will be!



DRESS POLICY ~ If this is the first time you have attended the Traditional Latin Mass you may have noticed that our parishioners do not dress casually in the church. Since the changes of Vatican II in the Church, few parishes have had any kind of dress code: we still believe that modesty and appropriate attire are necessary, especially in Church out of reverence for the Most Blessed Sacrament. Please observe these minimum standards of dress for attendance at Church and when attending any functions at the Chapel:
