Sunday within the Octave of the Nativity

GOSPEL Luke 2:33-40. At that time, His father and mother were wondering at those things which were spoken concerning Him. And Simeon blessed them and said to Mary His mother: "Behold this Child is set for the fall and for the resurrection of many in Israel and for a sign which shall be contradicted. And thy own soul a sword shall pierce, that, out of many hearts thoughts may be revealed."

And there was one Anna, a prophetess, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Aser. She was far advanced in years and had lived with her husband seven years from her virginity. And she was a widow until fourscore and four years: She never left the temple, with fastings and prayers worshipping night and day. And coming up at that very hour, she began to give praise to the Lord: and spoke of Him to all that looked for the redemption of Israel.

And after they had performed all things according to the law of the Lord, they returned into Galilee, to their city Nazareth. And the Child grew and waxed strong, full of wisdom: and the grace of God was in Him.



If we have kept a diligent Advent...


If we have kept a diligent Advent, we shall be able to celebrate the Christmas Season better than those who have been trying to inflate an imitation of it ever since Halloween without understanding what it is all about. The Incarnation of Christ the Son of God is celebrated for twelve days, and in the Catholic Church the Christmas carols begin, and do not end, on Christmas Day.

When I lived in Rome, I came to learn different Christmas customs, and among them was the singing of a hymn by Saint Alphonsus Liguori: "Tu scendi dalle Stelle" (You come down from the stars) with these lines: "Great King, from heaven's high throne descending low, In Bethlehem's stable born in cold and woe, Thou shivers in a manger, Babe Divine, Much hast Thou borne for sins: how much for mine!"

The season of gift-giving begins on December 25th and reaches its climax on the Epiphany, when the Magi brought their offerings.

The Holy Trinity needs nothing, but the Father and the Son and the Holy Ghost want us. In other words, we are not necessary, but we are willed by the Divine Love. With nothing to offer God that he needs, the best gift we can offer is a humble confession of the various ways the human soul has blocked the will of God. Sin contradicts our existence. Confession provides many graces. Sins are forms of selfishness, but when confessed they become the greatest gifts, offerings of the heart, and they place us back into God's plan for the human race.

You might give yourself a fine gift by getting one of the many books written by the twentieth century English convert, Monsignor Ronald Knox. In his "Stimuli" he writes: "To us Christians, the first Christmas Day is the solstice or bottleneck of history. Things got worse till then, ever since we had lost Paradise; things are to get better from then, till we reach Paradise once more. History is shaped like an X". THE HOLY INNOCENTS The story of the slaughter of the Holy Innocents is part of the narrative of Jesus' birth. Herod governed the Jewish portion of the Roman Empire when Jesus was born. When he heard that people looked for the birth of a new "King of the Jews," and that scholars from the east had already come to worship Him, Herod felt threatened. He learned that this Messiah was to be born in Bethlehem and sent for the visiting magi. He cross examined them to learn what they knew, then told them to report back to him after they found the Child under the pretense that he, Herod, wanted to pay homage as well.

The magi were warned in a dream to avoid returning to Herod, so they went home a different way. At the same time, an angel warned Joseph to flee with Mary and Jesus to Egypt because "Herod is going to search for the Child to destroy Him" (Mt 2:13).

When Herod learned that the magi had deceived him, he became furious and ordered the murder of all the boys in and near Bethlehem two years old or younger.

Tradition has inferred the slaughter of the Bethlehem children to have killed numbers of children----several thousand---but it is not likely that nearly this many were killed. Considering the size of Bethlehem, including its surroundings, there could not have been more than 25 baby boys two years old or younger at any given time.

St. Augustine called the Innocents, buds killed by the frost of persecution the moment they showed themselves. Herod was a barbaric ruler responsible for many crimes and slaughters.

The feast of the Holy Innocents has been remembered by the Church since the fifth century.

Epiphany: A Fourfold Feast. The Epiphany, one of the oldest Christian feasts, originally celebrated four different events, in the following order of importance: the Baptism of the Lord; Christ's first miracle, the changing of water into wine at the wedding in Cana; the Nativity of Christ; and the visitation of the Wise Men or Magi. Each of these is a revelation of God to man: At Christ's Baptism, the Holy Ghost descends and the voice of God the Father is heard, declaring that Jesus is His Son; at the wedding in Cana, the miracle reveals Christ's divinity; at the Nativity, the angels bear witness to Christ, and the shepherds, representing the people of Israel, bow down before Him; and at the visitation of the Magi, Christ's divinity is revealed to the Gentiles—the other nations of the earth. Eventually, the celebration of the Nativity was separated out, in the West, into Christmas; and shortly thereafter, Western Christians adopted the Eastern feast of the Epiphany, still celebrating the Baptism, the first miracle, and the visit from the Wise Men. Thus, Epiphany came to mark the end of Christmastide—the twelve days of Christmas, which began with the revelation of Christ to Israel in His Birth and ended with the revelation of Christ to the Gentiles at Epiphany.

FATHER SAFREED'S REFLECTIONS

PUTTING THE [NEFARIOUS] PLAN OF MODERNISM INTO ACTION Continuing with "Vatican II Exposed as Counterfeit Catholicism"

Satan Hard at Work

Satan, who fell through pride, offers enticing rewards in this life to those who do his bidding. Modernism is his special creation to deceive souls and destroy their faith and morals. Diabolical intelligence planned Vatican II. His agents created a new, Counterfeit Church by utilizing Catholic buildings worldwide to conduct man-centered worship and spread heretical doctrines.

Saul Alinsky (1909-1972), a well-known revolutionary from Chicago, Illinois, wrote the book, *Rules for Radicals: a Pragmatic Primer for Realistic Radicals*. His principles can be applied to a religious revolution, especially the importance of infiltration from within. Alinsky dedicated his book to "...the first radical known to man who rebelled against the establishment and did it so effectively that he at least won his own kingdom—Lucifer."

Implementing their Plan

People from various nationalities, regions and social backgrounds united their efforts in their attempt to destroy the Church from within. The multiple facets of their plan are like interconnected pieces of a puzzle. Modernists achieved their ultimate goal when all the pieces fell in place. Modernists at Vatican II used the political "bait and switch" technique, proposing minor changes while making essential ones. Familiar words were used to make it appear as if nothing had changed. Council moderators bent the rules and silenced opponents. Since Modernists seized control from the beginning, there was little the opposition could do.

Revolution

Changes made to doctrine and worship by Vatican II were revolutionary and turned Catholic beliefs upside down. The word *revolution* is derived from the Latin word *volvere*, to flip over.

Human nature was enthroned, while God was dethroned.

Liturgy became social entertainment, not a form of worship to God.

People were told to work for a better world, not to attain eternal life.

Christ's humanity was stressed, while His divinity denied.

Nature became "graced," while the effects of original sin were ignored.

Salvation was granted to all, not something obtained by effort and prayer.

The meal table became prominent, while the tabernacle was hidden to the side.

The spirit of the secular world was to be embraced, not rejected as Christ had done.

When Modernists proposed a humanist religion based on man, many took the bait. This new religion would be easier to practice, because emphasis was no longer placed on personal responsibility to God for one's actions. Morality can now be determined by the individual.

Since the changes of Vatican II in the Church, few parishes have had any kind of dress code: we still believe that modesty and appropriate attire are necessary, especially in Church out of reverence for the Most Blessed Sacrament. 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The Octave of the Nativity is celebrated from Christmas Day to January 1st, the Circumcision of Our Lord. In the Old Testament, circumcision was a sign of the covenant between God and Abraham, and thus between God and the Jewish people. The oath of this covenant was sealed by the act and sign of circumcision. It was on the eighth day that this important event took place.

Many see this as "just another feast day". In fact, some grumble about it as an inconvenient feast day because it falls on New Year's Day – a holy day of obligation following a night of revelry and staying up way past bedtime. But this feast day marks an important clarification of the doctrine of Christ's divinity and humanity.
