## Low Sunday

**GOSPEL John 20:19-31** At that time, when it was late the same day, the first of the week, and the doors were shut, where the disciples were gathered together, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood in the midst and said to them: "Peace be to you."

And when He had said this, He showed them His hands and His side.

The disciples therefore were glad, when they saw the Lord. He said therefore to them again: "Peace be to you. As the Father hath sent Me, I also send you." When He had said this, He breathed on them; and He said to them: "Receive ye the Holy Ghost.

Whose sins you shall forgive, they are forgiven them: and whose sins you shall retain, they are retained."

Now Thomas, one of the twelve, who is called Didymus, was not with them when Jesus came. The other disciples therefore said to him: "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them: "Except I shall see in His hands the print of the nails and put my finger into the place of the nails and put my hand into His side, I will not believe."

And after eight days, again His disciples were within, and Thomas with them. Jesus came, the doors being shut, and stood in the midst and said: "Peace be to you." Then He said to Thomas: "Put in thy finger here and see My hands.

And bring your hand and put it into My side. And be not faithless but believing."

Thomas answered and said to Him: "My Lord and my God."

Jesus said to him: "Because thou hast seen Me, Thomas, thou hast believed: blessed are they that have not seen and have believed."



**Saint George** (between AD 256–285 to April 23, 303), was a Roman soldier of Greek and Palestinian origin and an officer in the Guard of Roman emperor Diocletian, who was sentenced to death for refusing to recant his Christian faith. As a Christian martyr, he later became one of the most venerated saints in Christianity and was especially venerated by the Crusaders. George's parents were Christians of Greek nobility, his father, a Roman army official and his mother, a Christian and a Greek native from Lydda in the Roman province of Syria Palaestina. His father died when he was 14 and his mother returned with George to her homeland.

At seventeen, he traveled to the capital at Nicomedia and following the customary course of a young Roman noble, he joined the Roman army. By his late twenties, George was promoted to the rank of military tribune and stationed as an imperial guard of the Emperor at Nicomedia.

On February 23, 303, Diocletian issued an edict that every Christian soldier in the army should be degraded and every soldier required to offer sacrifice to the Roman gods. Seeing the edict, George freed his slaves, distributed his wealth to the poor, and prepared to meet his fate. He then confronted the emperor about the edict and declared himself to be a Christian. Diocletian attempted to convert George, offering gifts if he would sacrifice to the gods, but he refused. Diocletian ordered that George be arrested. In an effort to undermine his resolve, the emperor sent a woman to the prison to spend the night with George, who having little time for earthly concerns managed to convert her instead. St. George was executed by decapitation before Nicomedia's city wall on April 23, 303.

In hagiography, as one of the Fourteen Holy Helpers and one of the most prominent military saints, he is immortalized in the myth of Saint George & the Dragon. There are several stories about George fighting dragons, but in the Western version, a dragon has made a nest at a spring that provides water to a township. The people were unable to collect water and so attempted to remove the dragon from its nest. It would temporarily leave its nest when they offered it a sheep. It was decided that a maiden would be just as effective as sending a sheep. The townspeople chose the victim by drawing straws. This continued until one day the princess' straw was drawn. The monarch begged for her to be spared but the people would not have it. She was offered to the dragon, but before she could be devoured, George appeared. He faced the dragon, protected himself with the sign of the Cross, and slayed the dragon. After saving the town, the citizens abandoned their paganism and were all converted to Christianity.

Saint George's Day is traditionally celebrated on April 23rd. Numerous countries, cities, professions and organizations claim Saint George as their patron, most notably, England.

## FATHER SAFREED'S REFLECTIONS

### MODERNISM XVIII

### BISHOP OF ROCHESTER

Sheen wrote 73 books, served as Auxiliary Bishop of New York under Cardinal Spellman from 1951—1965, became Bishop of Rochester from 1966—1969 and an honorary archbishop in 1969. “Bishop Sheen brought the thinking of the Second Vatican Council to his pastoral ministry in the [Rochester] diocese.” said a pundit. Implementing the Spirit of Vatican II, Sheen turned the diocesan Minor Seminary into a co-ed school with a layman in charge. He added Protestant ministers and an **expert on Teilhard de Chardin** to the faculty of the Major Seminary. [Ugh!]

In 1967, diocesan seminarians joined students from Colgate Rochester Divinity School (that trained ministers for 15 Protestant denominations) to assist those in the slums. Archbishop Sheen began to question former practices and beliefs of the Catholic Church and instill those taught at Vatican II.

He not only was a Modernist and Progressive, he became the American leader of the movement. **It would have taken valor for Bishop Sheen to oppose John XXIII and Paul VI , since he was a close friend of theirs, yet at a time when the Church needed someone with the courage of St. Athanasius to defend her in one of her darkest hours, Sheen, who enjoyed celebrity status, chose to side with the Modernist majority.**

### REGRETS?

In later life, Sheen became less enthusiastic about the changes. He condemned liturgical abuses following Vatican II and recommended a holy hour of reparation by clergy. When Archbishop Sheen told individuals at a Eucharistic Congress that what they were doing was wrong, some in attendance tried to silence him. Before death, he may have regretted some of his decisions and wished to return to the Faith he left. May God have mercy on his soul.

**DRESS POLICY** ~ If this is the first time you have attended the Traditional Latin Mass you may have noticed that our parishioners do not dress casually in the church. Since the changes of Vatican II in the Church, few parishes have had any kind of dress code: we still believe that modesty and appropriate attire are necessary, especially in Church out of reverence for the Most Blessed Sacrament. Please observe these minimum standards of dress for attendance at Church and when attending any functions at the Chapel:

**Everyone should refrain from jeans, shorts or T-shirts.** Ladies, use a head covering, available in the back of the church for loan or purchase.
