Seventh Sunday After Pentecost

GOSPEL Matt. 7:15-21 At that time, Jesus said to His disciples: "Beware of false prophets, who come to you in the clothing of sheep, but inwardly they are ravening wolves. By their fruits you shall know them. Do men gather grapes of thorns, or figs of thistles? Even so every good tree bringeth forth good fruit, and the evil tree bringeth forth evil fruit. A good tree cannot bring forth evil fruit, neither can an evil tree bring forth good fruit. Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit, shall be cut down, and shall be cast into the fire. Wherefore by their fruits you shall know them. Not everyone that saith to me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven: but he that doth the will of My Father who is in heaven, he shall enter into the kingdom of heaven."



Saint Jerome Emiliani's Story ~ Born 1481 at Venice, Italy to a wealthy family. Jerome's father died when he was a teenager, and he ran away from home at age 15. After a dissolute youth, he became a soldier in 1506.

A careless and irreligious soldier for the city-state of Venice, Jerome was captured in a military campaign at an outpost town and chained in a dungeon. In prison Jerome had a lot of time to think, and he gradually learned how to pray. When he escaped, he hung his metal chains in the nearby church -- in gratitude not only for being freed from physical prison but from his spiritual dungeon as well. Jerome returned to Venice where he took charge of the education of his nephews—and began

his own studies for the priesthood. He is believed to have developed the question-and-answer catechism technique for teaching children religion.

In the years after his ordination, events again called St. Jerome to a decision and a new lifestyle. Plague and famine swept northern Italy. St. Jerome began caring for the sick and feeding the hungry at his own expense. While serving the sick and the poor, he soon resolved to devote himself and his property solely to others, particularly to abandoned children. He founded three orphanages, a shelter for penitent prostitutes and a hospital. Around 1532, St. Jerome and two other priests established a congregation, the Clerks Regular of Somasca, dedicated to the care of orphans and the education of youth.

St. Jerome died in 1537, at the age of 56, from the disease he contracted while tending the sick.

St Jerome was beatified September 29, 1747 by Pope Benedict XIV, and canonized July16, 1767 by Pope Clement XIII. In 1928, Pius XI named him the patron of orphans and abandoned children. His Liturgical Feast Day is July 20th.

Reflection:

Very often in our lives it seems to take some kind of "imprisonment" to free us from the shackles of our self-centeredness. When we're "caught" in some situation we don't want to be in, we finally come to know the power of prayer. Only then can we become available to "the imprisoned" and "the orphaned" all around us.

Praver:

Saint Jerome Emiliani, watch over all children who are abandoned or unloved. Give us the courage to show them God's love through our care. Help us to lose the chains that keep us from living the life God intended for us. Amen

FATHER SAFREED'S REFLECTIONS

John XXIII part 8

From "Vatican II Exposed as Counterfeit Catholicism" by Frs. Francisco & Dominic Radecki, CMRI

On December 8, 1945, **Pope Pius XII**, fearing the conclave following his death would be split between two camps, determined in his Apostolic Constitution, "Vacantis Apostolicae Sedis," that a two-thirds majority plus one was required in a papal election. Since he believed that the Traditionalists still held a slight edge, the two-thirds majority plus one would make it more difficult to elect a Modernist. It precluded the possibility that an unscrupulous cardinal would vote for himself to obtain the necessary number of votes. Thus, in the 1958 conclave, 35 votes would be required to elect a new pope.

PAST PAPAL ELECTIONS

The method of electing popes varied greatly in the Early Church. Some popes were elected by the Roman clergy, often with the assent of the populace. Other papal elections were approved by emperors (such as Justinian) or other rulers. In 1059, **Pope Nicholas II** established the College of Cardinals to avoid possible outside interference. In 1139, it was determined that cardinals alone have the right to conduct papal elections. The papal conclave, during which the cardinals are locked in a room until an election takes place, began about a century later, following the death of **Pope Clement IV**. Intense rivalry between Italian and French cardinals resulted in a deadlock. This caused the longest interregnum or vacancy of the papacy until now, lasting for two years, nine months and two days. Finally, local citizens took matters into their own hands:

Impatient with the endless debates...[they] walled up the cardinals inside the one-room hall where they were meeting. As time dragged on, they also removed the roof, hoping thereby to hurry the decision. Finally, they rationed the cardinals' food.

Through the assistance of the Franciscan cardinal, St. Bonaventure, **Pope Gregory X** was elected finally in 1271. The Throne of Peter no longer vacant.

MYSTERIOUS DEATHS

When **Pope Pius XII** died on October 9, 1958, there were only fifty-five cardinals. This was the lowest number in many years due to the fact that **Pope Pius XII** knew many bishops and cardinals were suspected Modernists. Realizing that his successor would be chosen from among these cardinals and since so many bishops and archbishops had liberal tendencies, he was left with few choices of whom he could raise to the cardinalate. As a result, only 51 cardinals took part in the 1958 conclave. Their average age was 74.

DRESS POLICY ~ If this is the first time you have attended the Traditional Latin Mass you may have noticed that our parishioners do not dress casually in the church. Since the changes of Vatican II in the Church, few parishes have had any kind of dress code: we still believe that modesty and appropriate attire are necessary, especially in Church out of reverence for the Most Blessed Sacrament. Please observe these minimum standards of dress for attendance at Church and when attending any functions at the Chapel:

Everyone should refrain from jeans, shorts or T-shirts. Ladies, use a head covering, available in the back of the church for loan or purchase.



Remember, also, Lord, Your servants and handmaids below who are gone hence before us, marked with the sign of faith, and sleep the sleep of peace. To them, Lord and to all that rest in Christ, grant, we implore You a place of happiness, light and peace through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.
