Fourteenth Sunday After Pentecost

GOSPEL Matt. 6:24-33 At that time, Jesus said to His disciples: "No man can serve two masters. For either he will hate the one and love the other: or he will sustain the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and mammon. "Therefore, I say to you, be not solicitous for your life, what you shall eat, nor for your body, what you shall put on.

Is not the life more than the meat: and the body more than the raiment? Behold the birds of the air, for they neither sow, nor do they reap, nor gather into barns: and your heavenly Father feeds them. Are not you of much more value than they? And which of you by taking thought, can add to his stature one cubit? "And for raiment why are you solicitous? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they labor not, neither do they spin. But I say to you, that not even Solomon in all his glory was arrayed as one of these. And if the grass of the field, which is today, and tomorrow is cast into the oven, God doth so clothe: how much more you, O ye of little faith! "Be not solicitous therefore, saying: What shall we eat: or what shall we drink, or wherewith shall we be clothed? For after all these things do the heathens seek. For your Father knows that you have need of all these things. Seek ye therefore first the kingdom of God, and His justice, and all these things shall be added unto you."



Saint Rose of Lima was born Isabel Flores de Olivia in the city of Lima, Peru on April 20, 1586. Her later nickname "Rose" comes from an incident in her infancy: a servant claimed to have seen her face transform into a rose. In 1597 Isabel was confirmed and she formally took the name of Rose at that time.

As a young girl, in emulation of the noted Dominican tertiary Catherine of Siena, she began to fast three times a week and performed severe penances in secret. Despite the censure of her parents, she spent many hours contemplating the Blessed Sacrament, which she received daily, an extremely rare practice in that period.

After daily fasting, she took to permanently abstaining from eating meat. She helped the sick and hungry around her community, bringing them to her room and taking care of them. Rose sold her fine needlework, and took flowers that she grew to market, to help her family. She made and sold lace and embroidery to care for the poor, and she prayed and did penance in a little grotto that she had built. Otherwise, she became a recluse, leaving her room only for her visits to church.

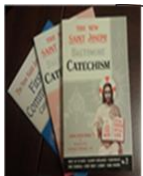
She attracted the attention of the friars of the Dominican Order. St. Rose wanted to become a nun, but her father forbade it, so she instead entered the Third Order of St. Dominic while living in her parents' home. In her twentieth year she donned the habit of a tertiary and took a vow of perpetual virginity. She only allowed herself to sleep two hours a night at most, so that she had more hours to devote to prayer. She donned a heavy crown made of silver, with small spikes on the inside, in emulation of the Crown of Thorns worn by Christ.

For eleven years she lived this way, with intervals of ecstasy, and eventually died on August 24, 1617, at the young age of 31. It is said that she prophesied the date of her death. Her funeral was held in the cathedral, attended by all the public authorities of Lima. Her feast day is on August 30th.

Saint Rose was beatified by Pope Clement IX on May 10, 1667, and canonized on April 12, 1671, by Pope Clement X. She was the first Catholic in the Americas to be declared a saint. Her shrine, alongside those of her friends Martin de Porres and John Macias, is located inside the convent of Saint Dominic in Lima.

The Catholic Church says that many miracles followed her death: there were stories that she had cured a leper, and that, at the time of her death, the city of Lima smelled like roses; roses also started falling from the sky. Many places in the New World are named Santa Rosa after her.

Saint Rose is the patroness of the Americas, especially of Lima, Peru, of Sittard in the Netherlands, of India, and of the Philippines, as well as embroiderers, gardeners, florists and people ridiculed or misunderstood for their piety and for the resolution of family quarrels.

FATHER SAFREED'S REFLECTIONS

JOHN XXIII part 15

From "Vatican II Exposed as Counterfeit Catholicism" by Frs. Francisco and Dominic Radecki, CMRI

Author, Tony Spina, noted during the 1958 conclave, "Swarms of starlings darkened the sky over the Sistine Chapel on the final day of the conclave." The unusual and puzzling events associated with this pivotal papal election, when taken cumulatively with other events, manifest a struggle to control the world's most powerful spiritual office.

When a pope is elected, he is formally asked if he accepts the decision. "Do you accept your election, canonically make, as Supreme Pontiff?" If he accepts, he simply answers "Accepto," "I do accept it." At that moment he becomes pope. If he refuses, the election continues and balloting resumes. **Cardinal Roncalli was so sure of being elected, that on October 28, 1958, when Cardinal Tisserant asked if he would accept the papal office, he pulled out "a well-prepared speech from his pocket. He was ready."** He then took the name John XXIII.

THE CARDINAL SIRI CONTROVERSY

One explanation of the white / black smoke and irregularities of the 1958 papal election may have been due to Cardinal Siri being elected on an early ballot. If this was the case, he must have refused the office; otherwise the conclave would not have continued.

Although stories have circulated that he and his family and / or Catholics in Communist countries were threatened if he accepted the papacy, once he refuses the papal office, he is not the pope. In addition, Siri made no public statement proclaiming that he was pope.

Siri took part in the papal conclaves of 1958, 1963 and two in 1978. On November 1, 1958, Cardinal Siri gave public obeisance to John XXIII saying, "I have called you together to thank God for the election of our Holy Father, John XXIII." He acknowledged Paul VI, John Paul I and John Paul II as popes. Cardinal Siri signed the Documents of Vatican II as Guiseppe Cardinal Siri. Additionally, he never said he was pope and he never wore papal attire. Siri certainly was not a traditionalist as claimed by his followers. He offered the New Mass and confected the New Sacraments. Since Siri was never pope, he could not make cardinals.



Remember, also, Lord, Your servants and handmaids below who are gone hence before us, marked with the sign of faith, and sleep the sleep of peace. To them, Lord and to all that rest in Christ, grant, we implore You a place of happiness, light and peace through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.
