Third Sunday after Pentecost

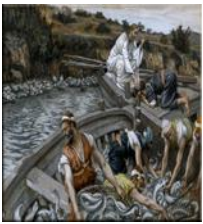
GOSPEL Luke 5:1-11 At that time, when the multitudes pressed upon Jesus to hear the word of God, he stood by the lake of Genesareth and saw two ships standing by the lake: but the fishermen were gone out of them and were washing their nets. And going into one of the ships that was Simon's, He desired him to draw back a little from the land. And sitting, He taught the multitudes out of the ship. Now when He had ceased to speak, He said to Simon: "Launch out into the deep and let down your nets for a draught."

And Simon answering said to Him: "Master, we have labored all the night and have taken nothing: but at Thy word I will let down the net." And when they had done this, they enclosed a great multitude of fishes: and their net broke.

And they beckoned to their partners that were in the other ship, that they should come and help them. And they came and filled both the ships, so that they were almost sinking.

Which when Simon Peter saw, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying: "Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord." For he was wholly astonished, and all that were with him, at the draught of the fishes which they had taken. And so were also James and John, the sons of Zebedee, who were Simon's partners. And Jesus said to Simon: "Fear not: from henceforth thou shalt catch men."

And having brought their ships to land, leaving all things, they followed Him.



Gospel Commentary ~ The miracle described in today's Gospel was intended primarily to strengthen Simon's faith in the Master and to make him ready at the call of Jesus to leave family, friends and possessions to become the disciple and constant companion of the Rabbi of Nazareth. The miracle was intended to strengthen Simon's faith in the days when the Master would walk no longer with the brethren, and the dreadful burden of leadership would weigh heavily on the first Vicar of Christ. For us one lesson of today's Gospel is that of the reward of obedience, of the success of the work, which is undertaken at God's word, and for a right intention.

To that kind of work belongs every task, which ordered by God's command to execute such tasks there goes a guarantee that His help will be given for that performance. The man of faith, who sees everywhere the working out of God's plans, will not be despondent nor lose heart if things seem to go badly for him. He will not repine, nor wish he had the tasks of others: he will go on steadily doing his round of duties, confident that he who seeks to fulfill God's commands will not fail, nor be deprived of reward. He will not be like the fishermen who toiled all the night and caught nothing; his every task and duty, however slight, will be accomplished with the intention of doing God's will and his reward will be like that of the fisherman who let down his net as Christ directed. *Commentary by Msgr. Saint Aloysius Gonzaga was born Luigi Gonzaga, the eldest son of the Marquis of Castiglione, an Italian nobleman, on March 9, 1568. From the earliest age, the young saint was given to prayer. Legend has it that his first spoken words were the Holy Names of Mary and Jesus.

St. Aloysius was raised in the castle Castiglione delle Stivieri in Lombardy, with many servants, and plenty of wealth and comfort. It was natural for his father to have had great hopes that he would have a military career and succeed him in the nobility with title and property.

However, by age 9, he had privately decided on a religious life and made a vow of perpetual virginity. He practiced many devotions and mortifications and safeguarded himself at all times from possible temptation. St. Aloysius preferred to spend his free time in prayer, kneeling on a cold stone floor or in the church in front of the Blessed Sacrament.

In 1577, his father took him and his brother to Florence to study and improve their Latin and Italian. As it would happen, the young man would develop an affinity for the study of the saints even more than his regular studies. At this time St. Aloysius read of the Jesuit missionaries in India, and he resolved to join the Society of Jesus. He began this direction in life by instructing the poor boys of Castiglione in catechism.

At the age of 12, he encountered the great ecclesiastic Saint Charles Borromeo and he received his first Holy Communion from him.

St. Aloysius insisted that he be allowed to assist with the sick and he served in a hospital during the plague of 1587 in Milan. In time, he fell victim to the dreaded disease himself, and died at the age of 23, after receiving the last rites from Saint Robert Bellarmine, who later wrote the Life of Saint Aloysius.

It was revealed to him that he would pass on the Octave of Corpus Christi, and though he appeared much better in the days preceding the Feast, St. Aloysius Gonzaga did, in fact, die on the Octave of Corpus Christi, June 21st, 1591.

Who would serve as a better example or be a good patron saint for young people if not St Aloysius? Who would make a good advocate and intercessor for young people and their prayers in Heaven? This young saint is a model for all Catholic youth. He was filled with a love of God, remorse for his sins, and a desire for purity of mind, body, and heart.

St Aloysius, a patron to all young people, was beatified in 1621 and declared a saint in 1725. His relics are buried under the altar of Saint Ignatius Church in Rome. His feast day is celebrated on June 21st.

We gladly welcome visitors and newcomers. At the same time, we respectfully remind you that to receive Our Lord in Holy Communion, one must be:

A baptized Catholic free from any mortal sin committed since one's last Confession. Fasting for three hours from any food and/or alcoholic beverage.

One hour from any other beverage except water.

DRESS POLICY ~ If this is the first time you have attended the Traditional Latin Mass you may have noticed that our parishioners do not dress casually in the church. Since the changes of Vatican II in the Church, few parishes have had any kind of dress code: we still believe that modesty and appropriate attire are necessary, especially in Church out of respect for the True Presence of Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, and for the edification of our neighbor, we kindly request that all who come to our parish observe the basic traditional Catholic standards of dress for church attendance

and to receive communion at the communion rail:

Women and girls must cover their heads. (Chapel veils or mantillas are available for loan or purchase in the vestibule.)

Women and girls must wear dresses or skirts that cover the knee completely when standing or sitting. Slacks, jeans, shorts, sleeveless, tight or low-cut clothing, and dresses or skirts with long slits above the knees are not permitted.

It is recommended for men and boys to wear suit coats and ties for Sunday Mass.

Jeans and other casual attire are inappropriate for attendance at church.



Remember, also, Lord, Your servants and handmaids below who are gone hence before us, marked with the sign of faith, and sleep the sleep of peace. To them, Lord and to all that rest in Christ, grant, we implore You a place of happiness, light and peace through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.
