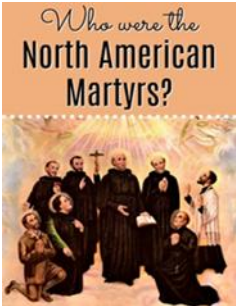

Seventeenth Sunday after Pentecost

GOSPEL Matt. 22, 34-46 At that time, the Pharisees, came to Jesus and one of them, a doctor of the Law, putting Him to the test, asked Him, “Master, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?” Jesus said to him, “You shall love the Lord your God with your whole heart, and with your whole soul, and with your whole mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. And the second is like it, You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments depend the whole Law and the Prophets.” Now while the Pharisees were gathered together, Jesus questioned them saying, “What do you think of the Christ? Whose son, is He?” They said to Him, “David’s”. He said to them, “How then does David in the Spirit call Him Lord”, saying, “The Lord said to my Lord: Sit at My right hand, till I make Your enemies Your footstool?” If David, therefore, calls Him Lord, how is He, his son?” And no one could answer Him a word; neither did anyone dare from that day forth to ask Him any more questions.



St. Isaac Jogues, S.J. (10 January 1607 – 18 October 1646) Isaac Jogues and his companions were the first martyrs of the North American continent officially recognized by the Church. As a young Jesuit, Isaac Jogues, a man of learning and culture, taught literature in France. He gave up that career to work among the Huron Indians in the New World, and in 1636, he and his companions, under the leadership of Jean de Brébeuf, arrived in Quebec. The Hurons were constantly attacked by the Iroquois, and in a few years, Father Jogues was captured by the Iroquois and imprisoned for 13 months. An unexpected chance for escape came to Isaac Jogues through the Dutch, and he returned to France, bearing the marks of his sufferings. Welcomed home as a hero, Father Jogues might have sat back, thanked God for his safe return, and died peacefully in his homeland. But his zeal led him back once more to the fulfillment of his dreams. In a few months he sailed for his missions among the Hurons.

In 1646, he and Jean de Lalande, who had offered his services to the missionaries, set out for Iroquois country in the belief that a recently signed peace treaty would be observed. They were captured by a Mohawk war party, and on October 18, Father Jogues was tomahawked and beheaded. Jean de Lalande was killed the next day at Ossernenon, a village near Albany, New York.

The first of the Jesuit missionaries to be martyred was René Goupil who with Lalande, had offered his services as an oblate. He was tortured along with Isaac Jogues in 1642 and was tomahawked for having made the sign of the cross on the brow of some children.

Father Anthony Daniel, working among Hurons who were gradually becoming Christian, was killed by Iroquois on July 4, 1648. His body was thrown into his chapel, which was set on fire.

Jean de Brébeuf was a French Jesuit who came to Canada at the age of 32 and labored there for 24 years. He went back to France when the English captured Quebec in 1629 and expelled the Jesuits but returned to his missions four years later. Although medicine men blamed the Jesuits for a smallpox epidemic among the Hurons, Jean remained with them.

He composed catechisms and a dictionary in Huron and saw 7,000 converted before his death in 1649. Having been captured by the Iroquois at Sainte Marie, near Georgian Bay, Canada, Father Brébeuf died after four hours of extreme torture.

Gabriel Lalemant had taken a fourth vow—to sacrifice his life for the Native Americans. He was horribly tortured to death along with Father Brébeuf.

Father Charles Garnier was shot to death in 1649 as he baptized children and catechumens during an Iroquois attack.

Father Noel Chabanel also was killed in 1649, before he could answer his recall to France. He had found it exceedingly hard to adapt to mission life. He could not learn the language, and the food and life of the Indians revolted him, plus he suffered spiritual dryness during his whole stay in Canada. Yet he made a vow to remain in his mission until death.

These eight Jesuit martyrs of North America were canonized in 1930. Their feast day is celebrated on 26 September. The National Shrine of the North American Martyrs, also dedicated as the Shrine of Our Lady of Martyrs, is a Roman Catholic shrine in Auriesville, N.Y.

Reflection ~ Faith and heroism planted belief in Christ's cross deep in our land. The Church in North America sprang from the blood of martyrs, as has been true in so many places. The ministry and sacrifices of these saints, challenges each of us, causing us to ask just how deep is our faith and how strong our desire to serve even in the face of death.

Weekly Catechism taken from Baltimore Catechism III, by Rev. Francis J. Connell

What is the Sacrament of Matrimony? It is the means by which a baptized man and a baptized woman bind themselves for life in a lawful marriage and receive the grace to discharge their duties.

What is the chief duty of husband and wife in the married state? The chief duty is to be faithful to each other and provide in every way for the welfare of the children God may give them.

Why does the bond of the sacrament of Matrimony last until the death of husband or wife? Because Christ has said: "*What therefore God has joined together, let no man put asunder.*" A separation, a divorce, or an attempted marriage with another person does not destroy the marriage bond.

What is meant by the unity of the sacrament of Matrimony? The unity of Matrimony means that the husband cannot during the life of his wife have another wife, nor the wife during the life of her husband have another husband. Any other sexual union during the life of either party is adultery.

Why is every true marriage between a baptized man and a baptized woman a sacrament? Because Christ Himself raised every marriage of this kind to the dignity of a sacrament.

Why has the Catholic Church alone the right to make laws regulating the marriages of baptized persons? Because the Church alone has authority over the sacraments and over sacred matters affecting baptized persons.

What authority has the State regarding the marriages of baptized persons? The State's only authority regarding the marriages of baptized persons is merely civil: for example, the right to share in the property of others.

What is necessary to receive the sacrament of Matrimony worthily? The persons must be in the state of grace, to know the duties of married life, and to obey the marriage laws of the Church.

In whose presence do the laws of the Church require a Catholic to be married? In the presence of the parish priest, or bishop, or a priest delegated by either of them, and before two witnesses.

What are the chief effects of the sacrament of Matrimony? *First*, an increase of sanctifying grace; *second*, the special help of God for the husband and wife to love each other faithfully, to bear with each other's faults, and to bring up their children in the Catholic faith.

What should Catholics do to prepare for a holy and happy marriage? *First*, pray that God may direct their choice; *second*, seek the advice of their parents and confessors; *third*, practice the virtues, especially chastity; *fourth*, frequently receive the sacraments of Penance and Holy Eucharist.

How can Catholics best obtain God's blessing for their marriage? To obtain God's blessing one must be married at a Nuptial Mass and receive Holy Communion devoutly.

DRESS POLICY ~ If this is the first time you have attended the Traditional Latin Mass you may have noticed that our parishioners do not dress casually in the church. Since the changes of Vatican II in the Church, few parishes have had any kind of dress code: we still believe that modesty and appropriate attire are necessary, especially in Church out of respect for the True Presence of Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, and for the edification of our neighbor, we kindly request that all who come to our parish observe the basic traditional Catholic standards of dress for church attendance

and to receive communion at the communion rail:

Women and girls must cover their heads. (Chapel veils or mantillas are available for loan or purchase in the vestibule.)

Women and girls must wear dresses or skirts that cover the knee completely when standing or sitting. Slacks, jeans, shorts, sleeveless, tight or low-cut clothing, and dresses or skirts with long slits above the knees are not permitted.

It is recommended for men and boys to wear suit coats and ties for Sunday Mass.

Jeans and other casual attire are inappropriate for attendance at church.



Remember, also, Lord, Your servants and handmaids below who are gone hence before us, marked with the sign of faith, and sleep the sleep of peace. To them, Lord and to all that rest in Christ, grant, we implore You a place of happiness, light and peace through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.
