Dedication of the Archbasilica of Our Savior (22nd Sunday after Pentecost)

GOSPEL: Luke 19:1-10 At that time, Jesus entered and was passing through Jericho. And behold there was a man named Zacchaeus; and he was a leading publican, and he was rich. And he was trying to see Jesus, Who He was, but could not, on account of the crowd, because he was small of stature. So, he ran on ahead and climbed up into a sycamore tree to see Him, for He was going to pass that way. And when Jesus came to the place, He looked up and saw him, and said to him, Zacchaeus, make haste and come down; for I must stay in your house today. And he made haste and came down and welcomed Him joyfully. And upon seeing it all began to murmur, saying, He has gone to be the guest of a man who is a sinner. But Zacchaeus stood and said to the Lord, Behold, Lord, I give one-half of my possessions to the poor, and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I restore it fourfold. Jesus said to him, today salvation has come to this house, since he, too, is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek and to save what was lost.



St. Frances Xavier Cabrini was born as Maria Francesca Cabrini on July 15, 1850 in Lombardy, Italy. She was born two months premature and the youngest of thirteen children. Frances would live most of her life in a fragile and delicate state of health. She dedicated her life to religious work from a young age and received a convent education at a school run by the Daughters of the Sacred Heart. She graduated with high honors and a teaching certificate.

When Frances was 18, she applied for admission to the religious congregation of the Daughters of the Sacred Heart but was turned down because of her poor health. Instead, a priest asked her to teach at the House of Providence Orphanage. In 1877, she became Mother Cabrini after she finally made her vows and took the religious habit, also adding Xavier to her name in honor of St. Francis Xavier.

When the House of Providence Orphanage closed, her bishop asked her to found the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart to care for the poor children in both schools and hospitals. In its first five years, the institute established seven homes and a free school and nursery. Frances wanted to continue her mission in China, but Pope Leo XIII urged her to go to the United States, a nation that was becoming flooded with Italian immigrants who needed her help.

On March 31, 1889, Frances arrived in New York City. Right from the beginning she encountered many disappointments and hardships. The house originally intended for her new orphanage was no longer available. Archbishop Michael Corrigan found them housing with the convent of the Sisters of Charity. Frances then received permission to found an orphanage in what is now West Park, New York and now known as Saint Cabrini Home.

Filled with a deep trust in God and endowed with a wonderful administrative ability, Frances founded 67 institutions, including orphanages, schools, and hospitals, within 35 years dedicated to caring for the poor, uneducated, sick, abandoned, and especially for the Italian immigrants. Her institutions were spread out in places all over the United States, including New York, Colorado, and Illinois.

In 1909, Frances became a naturalized citizen of the United States. Eight years later, on December 22, 1917, Frances passed at the age of 67, at the Columbus Hospital, one of her own hospitals, in Chicago, Illinois.

Frances' body was originally placed at the Saint Cabrini Home but was exhumed in 1931 as part of her canonization process. St. Frances Xavier Cabrini was beatified on November 13, 1938, by Pope Pius XI and canonized by Pope Pius XII on July 7, 1946, making her the first United States citizen to be canonized. Her feast day is celebrated on November 13th.

A baptized Catholic free from any mortal sin committed since one's last Confession.

Fasting for three hours from any food and/or alcoholic beverage.

One hour from any other beverage except water.

DRESS POLICY ~ If this is the first time you have attended the Traditional Latin Mass you may have noticed that our parishioners do not dress casually in the church. Since the changes of Vatican II in the Church, few parishes have had any kind of dress code; we still believe that modesty and appropriate attire are necessary, especially in Church out of respect for the True Presence of Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, and for the edification of our neighbor, we kindly request that all who come to our parish observe the basic traditional Catholic standards of dress for church attendance

and to receive communion at the communion rail:

Women and girls must cover their heads. (Chapel veils or mantillas are available for loan or purchase in the vestibule.)

Women and girls must wear dresses or skirts that cover the knee completely when standing or sitting. Slacks, jeans, shorts, sleeveless, tight or low-cut clothing, and dresses or skirts with long slits above the knees are not permitted.

It is recommended for men and boys to wear suit coats and ties for Sunday Mass.

Jeans and other casual attire are inappropriate for attendance at church.

What is an indulgence?

An indulgence is the remission granted by the Church of temporal punishment due to sins already forgiven. A person must be baptized to gain an indulgence.

What are some of the advantages of indulgences?

- 1) They cancel or lessen our temporal punishment.
- 2) They console us in our fear of God's judgement for our past sins and give us hope for the future.
- 3) They encourage us to go frequently to the sacraments and to do good works.

What are the two kinds of Indulgences?

- 1) Plenary indulgence – is the remission of all temporal punishment due to sins.
- 2) Partial indulgence – is the remission of part of the temporal punishment due to sins.

What are some ways to gain indulgences during the month of November?

From noon on Sunday, November 2nd to midnight after November 3rd, the faithful, as often as they visit a church or public oratory in order to pray for the dead, may gain a plenary indulgence, applicable only to the souls in Purgatory, on condition of confession and Communion, and the recitation, during each visit, of six Our Father's, six Hail Mary's, and six Glory Be's for the intentions of the Church.

Indulgences for the Poor Souls in the Month of November; The faithful who recite prayers or perform other devout exercises in supplication for the faithful departed during the month of November, may gain: An indulgence of 3 years once on each day of the month; A plenary indulgence on the usual conditions, if they perform these devotions daily for the entire month. (Raccolta, 589).

Those who, during the aforesaid month, take part in public services held in a church or public oratory in intercession for the faithful departed may gain: An indulgence of 7 years on each day of the month; A plenary indulgence, if they attend these exercises on at least fifteen days and in addition, go to confession, receive Holy Communion and pray for the intentions of the Church (Raccolta, 589).

The faithful who, during the period of the eight days from All Souls' Day (counting All Souls' Day, itself) visit a cemetery in a spirit of piety and devotion, and pray, even mentally, for the dead, may gain a plenary indulgence on the usual conditions, on each day of the eight days, applicable only to the dead. (Raccolta, 592).
