GOSPEL John 12:24-26 At that time, Jesus said to His disciples, "Amen, amen, I say unto you, unless the grain of wheat falls into the ground and dies, it remains alone. But if it dies, it brings forth much fruit. He who loves his life loses it; and he who hates his life in this world shall keep it unto life everlasting. If anyone serves Me, let him follow Me; and where I am, there shall also My servant be. If any man serves Me, My Father will honor him."

The Story of the Solemnity of the Assumption of Mary



The dogma of the Assumption of Mary has its roots in the early centuries of the Church.

The Catholic Church teaches that when Mary ended her earthly life, God assumed her, body and soul into heaven. This belief traces its roots back to the earliest years of the Church. While a site outside of Jerusalem was recognized as the tomb of Mary, the earliest Christians maintained that "no one was there".

According to St. John of Damascus, in the 5th century, at the Council of Chalcedon in 451, Roman Emperor Marcian requested the body of Mary, Mother of God. St. Juvenal, who was Bishop of Jerusalem replied that "Mary died in the presence of all the Apostles, but that her tomb, when opened upon the request of St. Thomas, was found empty; where from the Apostles concluded that the body was taken up to heaven," the saint recorded.

By the 8th century, around the time of Pope Adrian, the Church began to change its terminology, renaming the feast

day of the Memorial of Mary to the Assumption of Mary.

The belief in the Assumption of Mary was a widely held tradition, and a frequent meditation in the writings of saints throughout the centuries. However, it was not defined officially until the past century. In 1950, Pope Pius XII made an infallible, ex-cathedra statement in the Apostolic Constitution Munificentissimus Deus officially defining the dogma of the Assumption.

The pope wrote, "By the authority of our Lord Jesus Christ, of the Blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, and by our own authority, we pronounce, declare, and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma: that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever-Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory."

Friday, August 15th is the Feast of the Assumption which marks a major feast day and a public holiday in many countries. In most countries, including the United States, it is a Holy Day of Obligation.



St. Lawrence, Deacon and Martyr ~ Born (about) 225 - Died 258 This famous martyr of Rome lived in the second century. He was one of seven deacons who were in charge of giving help to the poor and the needy. Then big trouble started and the troublemakers who did not like Christians decided to kill Pope St.Sixtus II. As they took the Pope away for execution (to chop off his head), Lawrence followed him weeping. "Father, where are you going without your deacon?" The Pope answered, "I am not leaving you, my son, in three days you will follow me." Full of joy, Lawrence gave to the poor the rest of the money he had with him. He even sold expensive church vessels so he would have more money to give away. The prefect of Rome, a greedy man, thought the Church had a great fortune hidden away. He

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ordered Lawrence to bring the Church's treasure to him. The saint said he would, in three days. Then he went through the city and gathered together all the poor and sick people supported by the Church. He showed them to the prefect and said: "These people are the Church's treasure." The prefect was furious. In his anger he asked them to kill Lawrence slowly so he would suffer more. The saint was tied on top of an iron grill over a slow fire that roasted him. God gave him so much strength and joy that Lawrence joked with the judge saying, "Turn me over". Before he died, he prayed that the city of Rome might be converted to Jesus. He prayed that the Catholic faith would spread all over the world.

Lawrence died on August 10, 258. His feast spread throughout Italy and northern Africa. Emperor Constantine built a beautiful basilica in Lawrence's honor. St. Lawrence is among the saints mentioned in the First Eucharistic Prayer at Mass. He is the patron saint of school children and poor people. His Feast Day is August 10th.

At the same time, we respectfully remind you that to receive Our Lord in Holy Communion, one must be:

A baptized Catholic free from any mortal sin committed since one's last Confession.

Fasting for three hours from any food and/or alcoholic beverage.

One hour from any other beverage except water.

DRESS POLICY ~ If this is the first time you have attended the Traditional Latin Mass you may have noticed that our parishioners do not dress casually in the church. Since the changes of Vatican II in the Church, few parishes have had any kind of dress code: we still believe that modesty and appropriate attire are necessary, especially in Church out of respect for the True Presence of Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, and for the edification of our neighbor, we kindly request that all who come to our parish observe the basic traditional Catholic standards of dress for church attendance

and to receive communion at the communion rail:

Women and girls must cover their heads. (Chapel veils or mantillas are available for loan or purchase in the vestibule.)

Women and girls must wear dresses or skirts that cover the knee completely when standing or sitting. Slacks, jeans, shorts, sleeveless, tight or low-cut clothing, and dresses or skirts with long slits above the knees are not permitted.

It is recommended for men and boys to wear suit coats and ties for Sunday Mass.

Jeans and other casual attire are inappropriate for attendance at church.

GOSPEL for the 9th Sunday After Pentecost ~ Luke 19:41-47 At that time, when Jesus drew near to Jerusalem, seeing the city, He wept over it, saying: "If you had known, and that in this your day, even you, the things that are for your peace! But now they are hidden from your eyes. For the days shall come upon you when your enemies will throw up a rampart about you and surround you and shut you in on every side, and will dash you to the ground, and your children within you, and will not leave you one stone upon another, because you have not known the time of your visitation." And entering into the temple, He began to cast out them that sold therein and them that bought. Saying to them: "It is written: 'My house is the house of prayer.' But you have made it a den of thieves." And He was teaching daily in the temple.

Weekly Catechism taken from Baltimore Catechism III, by Rev. Francis J. Connell

What are the laws enacted by Pope Pius XII regarding the fast required before Holy Communion?

- 1. Water may be taken at any time before Holy Communion without breaking the fast.
- 2. Sick persons, though not confined to bed, may receive Holy Communion after taking medicine or non-alcoholic drinks.
- 3. All Catholics may receive Holy Communion after fasting **three** hours from food and alcoholic drinks and **one** hour from non-alcoholic drinks. This applies to midnight Mass as well as Masses celebrated in the morning, afternoon or evening.
- 4. One who has already received Holy Communion may not receive the Blessed Sacrament again on the same day, except in danger of death.

How should we prepare ourselves for Holy Communion?

We should prepare ourselves for Holy Communion by thinking of Our Divine Redeemer whom we are about to receive, and by making fervent acts of faith, hope, love, and contrition.

What should we do after Holy Communion?

After Holy Communion we should spend some time adoring Our Lord, thanking Him, renewing our promise of love and obedience to Him, and asking Him for blessings for ourselves and others.

What are the chief effects of a worthy Holy Communion?

First, a closer union with Our Lord and a more fervent love of God and our neighbor; second, an increase of sanctifying grace; third, preservation from mortal sin and remission of venial sin; fourth, the lessening of our inclination to sin and the help to practice good works.

When are we obligated to receive Holy Communion?

We are obliged to receive Holy Communion during Easter time each year and when in danger of death.

Why is it well to receive Holy Communion often, even daily?

It is well to receive Holy Communion often, even daily, because this intimate union with Jesus Christ, the Source of all holiness and the Giver of all graces, is the greatest aid to a holy life.

How should we show our gratitude to Our Lord for remaining always on our altars in the Holy Eucharist?

We should show our gratitude by visiting Him often, by reverence in church, by assisting at daily Mass, when possible, by attending parish devotions and by being present at Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.



Remember, also, Lord, Your servants and handmaids below who are gone hence before us, marked with the sign of faith, and sleep the sleep of peace. To them, Lord and to all that rest in Christ, grant, we implore You a place of happiness, light and peace through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.
